Future Of Hamlet Fails To Stir Green River Folk

GREEN RIVER — Within the existing boundaries of this hamlet in Pickering Twp., there are a total of 197 residents. And yet, on Thursday night, with the very future of the community on the Planning Board agenda, not a single person attended a public meeting at Brougham to hear the issues discussed.

To be fair, there was actually one man present but he wished to enquire only into the possibility of locating a licensed dog kennel at lot 35, conc. 6. Mr. Ralph Bachman had his application deferred until Nov. 25th when it will be considered after adjoining property owners are notified of his intentions.

Express Concern Planning Board members who had anticipated a packed chamber for the discussion, expressed concern over the apparent lack of interest. The Planning Director, John Faulkner assured the Board that three notices had been posted, two in the local stores and one on a nearby lamp post. He even drove in his car to obtain a copy of the poster as proof that the meeting had been advertised.

Mr. Rex Merritt suggested that if no one was present to object to the revision of the hamlet's boundaries, then the Board could only take it that everyone was satisfied.

The Planning Board is considering ten of the rural hamlets to establish a future development pattern. In addition to Green River, the others are:—Altona, Audley, Balsam, Brougham, Cherrywood, Claremont, Greenwood, Kinsale and Whitevale. For the present, Audley, Balsam and Kinsale will not be included in the full-scale report.

Originated In 1840 The hamlet of Green River originated in the 1840's and was known at that time as Smithville. The school was erected in 1959. It's three rooms accommodate 101 students. There are four existing commercial establishments including a combined service station and snack bar; a grocery store and post office; a general store a marine repair shop and an ornamental industry.

The buildings of an unused basket factory remain standing. Outstanding proposals are—a dog kennel operation and a prefabricated concrete business. There is also a semi-used turkey and poultry ranch. The hamlet's commercial potential is shown on completed maps, should be adopted. There was no opposition.

Drainage in the community is listed as generally good but with municipal services not available, all uses must be derived from private wells and disposal systems.

It was unanimously agreed that all changes in the area shown on completed maps, should be adopted. There was no opposition.

Assessments Unchanged By Municipal Board

GOODWOOD — Officials in charge of an Ontario Municipal Board Hearing here last week refused to alter the assessment on an Uxbridge Twp. property but still waived the cost of the appeal due to the sincerity of the appeal.

Kendal and Isabella Home, No. 47 Hwy., north-east of Goodwood, contested the assessment figures as applied against 25 acres of land and buildings and an additional 3 acre gravel pit. Previous appeals before the local Court of Revision and a County Judge had been sustained. The 25 acres of land and buildings was assessed for \$1,925. The 3 acre gravel pit was assessed for \$2,400.

Attending the Hearing was the Chairman, A. D. McCrae; Vice-Chairman, R. McCreary; City Assessor, Gordon Hepditch and Clerk Elwood Foskett.

Make Comparison Since Mr. Home was not supported by a solicitor, the Chairman allowed him every opportunity to speak on his own behalf. He argued that the assessment on his land was higher than on adjoining properties and named the farm of Arthur Parratt as a comparison. The assessor's records showed, however that the Home property carried a lower value rating than the Parratt premises. Mr. Binsted stated further that the Home house was assessed less than the going rate because it had been built on a "piece meal fashion."

With respect to the gravel pit, Mr. Home argued that he only worked out 1 acre per year and should therefore be assessed only for the one acre of gravel. He admitted that the value of the property was worth "possibly one million dollars" to him. "I don't think you wish to sell," commented chairman, McCrae.

System Not Perfect County Assessment Commissioner Hepditch said that in general, five acres is used as a basis for assessments on gravel pit lands. He pointed out that in the Home case, this figure had been reduced to 3 acres.

Mr. McCrae admitted that the system of assessment with regard to gravel pits "was not perfect" but it was used across the whole township and had been accepted in other appeal cases.

Since Mr. Home had already paid the cost of the appeal and had shown sincerity in the presentation of his case, the chairman ruled that all court costs would be assumed by the Crown.
