Fourth Straight Victory As Clippers Dump Woodville

With forty-five minutes to opening faceoff, someone turned on the lights. It gave Stouffville and Woodville plenty of time to prepare for the game, but it failed to lure the spectators. The Clippers, however, still dumped Woodville even though they played before an almost empty house.

'Clippers' were playing their second game in as many nights against the 'Maroons' after an 11-1 drubbing they handed out in Woodville Monday. Coach Harold Hodgson gave most of his regulars a rest for the contest, and dressed many of the rookies that have, up to this point, seen little action this year. They still managed a 5-2 victory.

The game was anything but exciting. It lacked speed, colour and punch. The lack-lustre contest failed to attract more than a dull roar from the meagre crowd, even when the hometowners scored.

Stouffville took advantage of weak goaltending on the 'Maroons' part, and notched four goals in the first period. Woodville, on the other hand, found a shaky defense, and moved in with two tallies.

Both weaknesses were overcome, somewhat, in the final two frames, with only one goal being added during the remainder of the game.

minutes before the puck was cleared. However, most of the shots were easy or wide. Slap shots from the point, although hard, were far from accurate, and caromed off the glass and the end boards.

Ross Brown, standing on the edge of the goal crease, deflected a long shot that sailed high into the end seats.

The shot, a drifter, rose steadily, and caught the top right hand corner of the Woodville net. Brian Murphy Nets Hat Trick Clippers Win In Lindsay

MARKHAM — Markham Juniors are slowly gaining a reputation of letting their fans down in the first period, then completely turning the tables and coming up with a victory. Such was the case, again, Friday night, when they spotted the visiting St. Michael's Buzzers three goals in the initial frame, then fought back to capture the contest 8-6.

St. Mike's seemed to play with the attitude of 'take a lead, let them catch up'. Only their thinking backfired when Markham, after 'catching up' for the third time, decided it wasn't enough to just tie the game.

The Buzzers opened the match by giving the Markham fans a taste of how the big city boys play. They fired three goals before the period was half over, making the hometowners look like they were skating on sand. The fans yawned and groaned, half-expecting a whitewash.

Even when the Seal-A-Wax squad retaliated with a pair of goals before the period ended, they were still being out-skated and out-hit.

However, the second period changed all that, and Markham came out like a new club. They skated, passed, checked, and scored, ending the frame with both squads sharing six goals. In the final twenty minutes, it was Markham all the way, as they notched the winner and added an insurance marker to send the fans home happy.

Big gun for the winners was left winger Brian Murphy, who lit the fire and kept it burning. He hit for three goals, which should have really been five. His goal put Markham on the scoreboard, his goal kept them in the game, and his goal tied the match at 6-6. He also cashed in on an assist, giving him a four-point night.

Andrew, the team captain, scored a goal, and assisted on two others, while Gary Brown, who played his first game with Markham, gained two points with a goal and an assist.

Chris Evans scored what proved to be the winning goal at the 2:35 mark of the final period. Andrew sewed up the game when he planted a pass from Gary Brown, with four minutes remaining in the match. Fifteen penalties were assessed by referee Blair Graham, including two for faceoff interference. St. Mike's were tagged for nine minors, while Markham served six.

Markham faces Whitby Friday night in their next home encounter. Game time at the community centre is 8:30 p.m.
