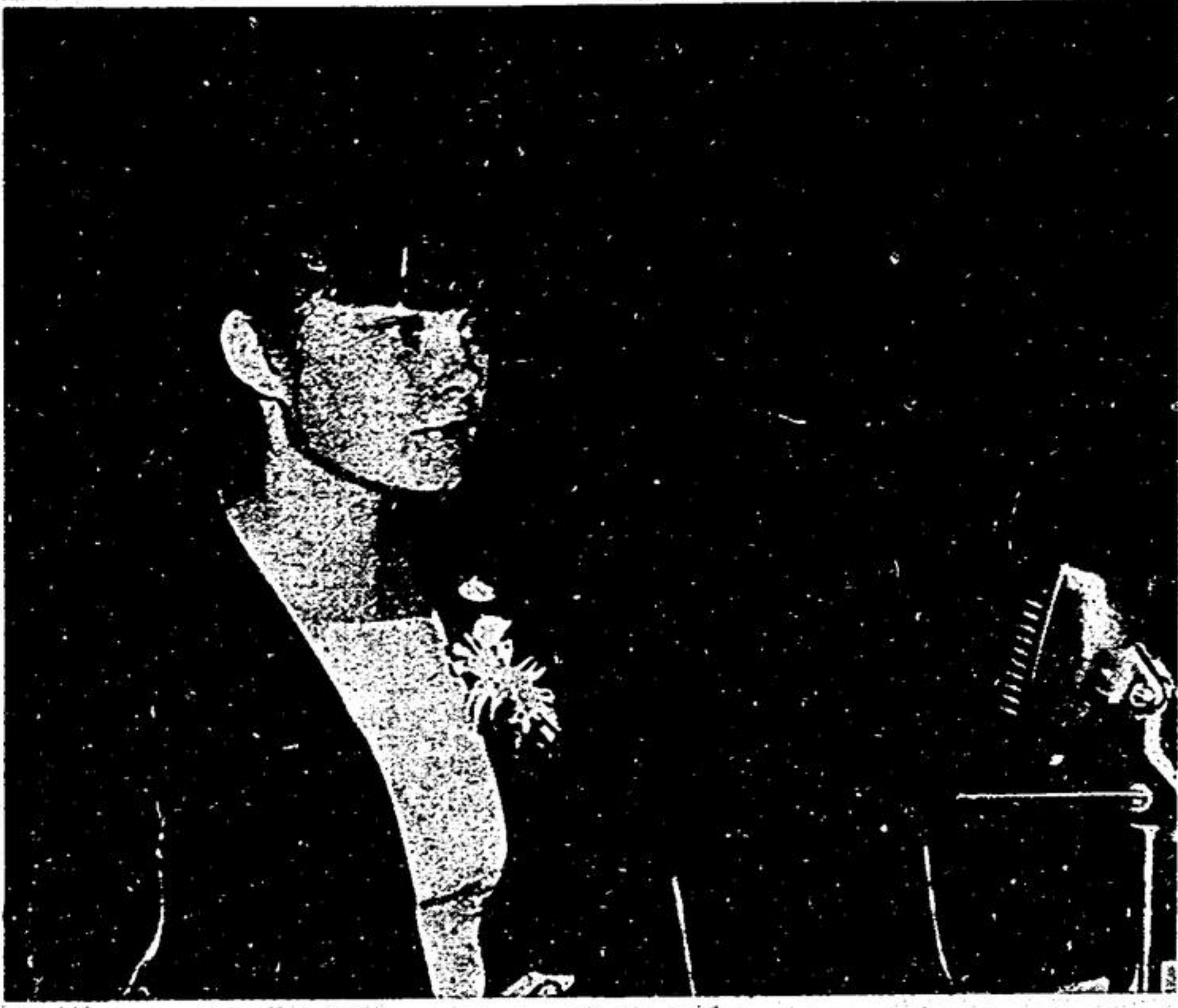


Delivered Valedictory Address

Separate School Supporters Seek Assessment Change

STOUFFVILLE — A petition, containing 37 names, was presented to a hearing of the Stouffville Court of Revision last week, requesting that their taxes be transferred to the support of the new Separate School in town. A break-down of the total included \$114,865 residential; \$12,695 commercial and \$3,799 business.

In the two cases, individual homes were occupied by persons who wished their taxes to go to the Public School. It was agreed that this should be done. However, on the property belonging to Fred Bigione, the land is assessed as a separate parcel and this tax will go to the Separate School. The Court made the necessary adjustment.

Other Cases
An appeal submitted by Stanley Schmidt of Burkholder St., on two lots currently "frozen" by the Conservation Authority was accorded an assessment reduction of \$150 on each property. An appeal against the assessment on his home was sustained.

Four appeals filed by Geo. Harman of Stouffer-Street were all sustained. A reduction of 15% was allowed in the business assessment on the T. Eaton Co. order office. Two appeals filed by Percy and Wesley Schell of Schell-Lumber Ltd. were both sustained. O. C. Weale appealed the business assessment on his fish and chip operation but no reduction was allowed. Mr. Weale said he would take his appeal before a Judge.

Many Parents 'Disturbed' As Children

STOUFFVILLE — Mr. F. K. Bowden of the Psychiatric Out-Patients Department of the York County Hospital at Newmarket is in agreement with a proposal by Public School Inspector, Maynard Hallman, that a special class should be established for emotionally disturbed children. Mr. Bowden addressed the November meeting of the Home and School Association here last week.

With reference to the Inspector's plan, Mr. Bowden suggested that some of to-day's parents could have benefitted from such instruction when they too were children. He pointed out also that the course could well be extended to include more adults. "We teach people how to raise cows and operate machines but there are no courses for adults on how to raise children," he said.

The speaker informed his audience that the psychiatric clinic at Newmarket included 22 beds and in a single year it was not unusual to be of service to 300 children. He said that in Markham Township alone, Inspector Hallman had reported that 400 school age pupils should be observed and perhaps treated.
