

Stouffville Wins Fifth Straight With 5-1 Victory

Haliburton Latest Clipper Victim

STOUFFVILLE — The controversial boys from the north country were in town Tuesday night. They put on a good show, but failed to leave Stouffville with a victory. As a matter of fact, Haliburton's loss gave the 'Clippers' their fifth straight win of the campaign. The homers have yet to taste defeat in regular league play.

With three goals in the space of eighty-six seconds in the first period, it looked as though Stouffville was going to send the 'Huskies' back up north, hanging their heads in shame. However, it didn't work out quite that way.

The visitors settled themselves down in the middle frame, notched their only goal, and kept the 'Clippers' scoreless. They also learned how to hit a man, something they did very little of in the first period. The hitting got harder, players flew further, and the play got sloppier as the contest aged.

A spokesman for the 'Huskies' was asked if the travelling is slowing down his players. He replied that, although this club will go further than some American astronauts this season, the boys like it, and it doesn't seem to bother them. They may not be tired, but something can be done with their shooting. More than three-quarters of the shots fired at the Stouffville net, missed their mark, some by an atrocious distance.

Dizzy First Period

The game was less than a minute old, and Stouffville had two men in the penalty box. Tom Benson came off at the 38 second mark for holding and Pete Evert followed twelve seconds later on a charging infraction. The visitors buzzed around 'Chuck' Doyle, but poor shooting lost them the chance of an early lead.

Pete Reesor hit paydirt for Stouffville at the 6:06 mark of the initial frame, with Bill Brown and Ken Aida copying him in swift order. Brown's goal, ran off the goal-post, and with Lady Luck, fell behind goalie Dave Austen.

Referee Jack Shropshire, with the game under control at all times, wasn't taking anything from anyone. He assessed Haliburton with a two-minute bench penalty, when a player uttered a remark that caught his ear. Garry Gartshore, Capt. of the team, was fingered as the culprit and sat out the sentence.

In the third period, Shropshire overheard a comment by George Sheppard, and nailed the player with a ten-minute misconduct.

Tabulating the entire evening, the referee whistled out twenty-two penalties for a grand total of 58 minutes.

Puddles formed on the ice in assorted places and each time one does, it forms a lump, or a break in the smooth surface. Perhaps this could be part of the reason for the mainly sloppy game. Even some fans were required to take shelter, or shift down a few feet the trip from Haliburton to Stouffville took a little more than two and a half hours to complete.
