Cons. Authority Seeks Loans for Flood Control

The Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority will request that long-term loans be made available by the Province to conservation authorities, for the financing of large flood control and water conservation programs.

This is one of 20 recommendations proposed by the MTRCA in its brief to the Ontario Legislature's Select Committee on Conservation Authorities.

The brief, prepared by a special committee of members of the MTRCA under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. A. Gardner, was approved last week by the Authority's executive committee. It now goes to the full 55-member Authority for ratification at its meeting on Nov. 19 at Toronto's City Hall.

The Authority asks that the Province re-negotiate with the Federal government the agreement made in 1961 for the MTRCA's \$38-million flood control and water conservation plan. It says such is necessary in order to provide for increased costs of works included in the original plan, and the inclusion of an escalator clause for future works. And it recommends that the Province pay 75 per cent in grant for all flood control works including flood plain and conservation lands acquisition, channel improvements, reservoirs and flood warning systems.
