**Under 15's Total 33% Of Country**

One-third of the population at mid-year was under the age of 15, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported.

The bureau estimated that of the total population of 19,572,000, 2,259,900 were under the age of five, 2,213,900 were five to nine years old, and 2,040,000 were 10 to 14 years of age.

This was an increase of 5.2 per cent in the under-15 age group since the 1961 census although the total population rose 7.3 per cent. The under-five group increased by only one-tenth of one per cent, indicating the decreased number of births in the last few years.

In contrast, the 10-to-14 group increased by nearly 10 per cent, and the 15-to-19 group, numbering 1,779,100, increased the fastest of all age groups, 24.2 per cent. The young-adult group of people 20 to 24 numbered 1,377,300 at mid-year, an increase of 16.4 per cent. These represent the Second World War's baby boom.

The bureau said that nearly 60 per cent of the total population at mid-year, some 11,562,600, were in the working ages, 15 to 64. In the retirement ages, 65 and over, there were 1,494,600 or 7.6 per cent of the population.
