

Room For "New Blood" On Town Council As Members Plan Moves

STOUFFVILLE — There will be at least two new members on the Town Council here in 1966-67. This much has been indicated through the recent announcement that councillor Bud Spang will not seek re-election and councillor Wm. Parsons will make a bid for the deputy-reeve's post.

Nominations will be accepted on Thursday evening (to-night) between 7:30 and 8:30 p.m. in the Veteran's Hall, Stouffville. Names of prospective candidates will be required to fill the offices on Council, Public Utilities Commission and Public School Board. A public meeting will follow.

Run For Reeve
Ken Laushway, the deputy-reeve on council for the past five years, indicated that he would seek the reeveship on Monday, Dec. 6th. He will likely be opposed by the present reeve, Win Timbers.

"I feel that the time has come to make a move," said Mr. Laushway, "and let some of the younger men move in." "It's either up or out," he said.

Councillor Parsons made it quite clear that if the deputy-reeve declined to make a bid for the reeve's post, he would go all the way. He agreed, however not to oppose Mr. Laushway, but would settle for the deputy-reeve's office. "I believe in a continuing council," he said.

Is Undecided
Councillor Kenneth Betz said that he had not yet made up his mind on whether or not he would seek re-election. "I'm undecided on whether to run or 'fall by the wayside' he said. He admitted that if he does allow his name to stand, it will again be for a councillor's post. "It keeps me busy down on the lower bracket," he said.

Both Robt. Lewis, Maytree Avenue and Tom Lonergan, Loretta Crescent, have declared publicly that they will accept nominations as councillors and Jim McKellar's name has also been mentioned as a would-be candidate.

Clerk Ralph Corner has ruled that any persons nominated for more than one position, must declare their intentions by 9:30 p.m. on Thursday evening. Falling this, the candidate will be obliged to run for the office for which he or she was first named.

Grant Drewery New Councillor In Uxbridge Twp.

GOODWOOD — There will be one new member on the council and three new trustees on the Public School Area Board for the next two years in Uxbridge Twp.

A total of twenty persons, including prospective candidates, attended a Nomination Meeting in the Community Hall here on Wednesday night. Although several were storm-stayed, all positions were adequately filled. There will be no election.

The new councillor is Grant Drewery of Glasgow. He fills the post made vacant through the withdrawal of councillor T. H. Akerman. Other positions are unchanged with Alvin Redshaw returned as reeve; Robt. Nesbitt, deputy-reeve, and Chas. Forsythe and Arthur Knight the councillors.

Only two of the original school board trustees will be back. Harry Noble and Harry Harper agreed to remain. New members include Donald Jackson, Donald Kennedy and Walter Todd.

With reference to the weather reeve Redshaw termed the meeting as the "stormiest" on record.

Chairman Elwood Foskett expressed regret for the inconvenience caused both the candidates and the ratepayers, but explained that there was no provision in the Act to alter the Nomination date once it is established by bylaw.

Foot Mangled When Caught In Power Takeoff

MT. ALBERT — A Unionville man had his right foot badly mangled on Saturday morning in the power takeoff of a farm tractor that was operating a feed mixer.

Harry Boardway, well-known service station operator at Unionville for many years, and recently retired from this business, is presently confined to the York County Hospital at Newmarket where he was taken by his son, Carman.

The accident occurred at his son's farm near Mount Albert. The victim's pant leg became entangled in the rotating shaft and his clothes were torn to shreds. Fortunately, Mr. Boardway was able to hang on or his injuries could have been fatal. The engine of the tractor stalled.

Carman heard his father call for aid and he was on the scene immediately. He cut him free and rushed him to hospital in his car. He remained conscious through the entire ordeal.

Both feet have been placed in casts and the full extent of the injury will not be known for several weeks.

Mr. Timbers said that all space was now in use but he expected that accommodation would be adequate for at least two or three years. "It's a real asset to the village," he said.

Fatal Accident In '63 Brings \$30,000 Award

STOUFFVILLE — A fatal accident in the west end of Stouffville on Feb. 9, 1963 has resulted in a \$30,000 settlement in favour of an Uxbridge truck driver, injured in the crash.

Idris Henry Preece, 40, received the award in a judgment handed down by the Ontario Supreme Court last week. Larry Preece, 18, of Stouffville, was killed in the head-on collision.

It was revealed that Mr. Preece had spent 21 months in hospital. Part of his right thigh bone was removed, leaving one leg shorter than the other. Mr. and Mrs. Preece had originally claimed the sum of \$151,000.

Mr. Preece was westbound on Hwy. 47 when the crash occurred. He was driving his wife's car. The 18-year-old boy was returning home and police believed that he may have fallen asleep at the wheel.

Sr. Citizens at Hunting Camp

Junior Player Ejected From Game Following Stick Attack On Referee

STOUFFVILLE — A Newmarket junior hockey player has been suspended indefinitely following a 'spearing' attack with his stick on an official at a game in the arena here on Tuesday night.

Referee John Pickett was knocked heavily to the ice by the blow and it was several minutes before he was revived by linesman Barry McLean.

Bill Morrison who had earlier been called for a high-sticking infraction, was immediately handed a match misconduct penalty when the official gained his composure. The details of the case will be heard by the executive of the O.H.A.

The attack occurred with less than a minute remaining in the second period. Time was called and the left-over portion was added to the final frame in order that the referee might go to the dressing room. He later returned and finished the game.

In all, 80 minutes in penalties were handed out to both clubs as tempers flared on several occasions. Stouffville edged the visitors 3-2.

Road Department Policy Debated By Council

STOUFFVILLE — Road department policy, an almost continuous point of argument in town council, was debated again on Thursday night with the return of foreman, Elgin Wagg from a week's vacation.

Both deputy-reeve Ken Laushway and councillor Wm. Parsons said they had received information that town-owned equipment had been used on private jobs.

Councillor Parsons also charged that an employee on week-end standby time, should not be employed privately.

Mr. Wagg replied that his department had a standing rule concerning the use of town equipment on private projects. "You should enforce it then,"

said Mr. Laushway.

With reference to an employee doing outside work while on standby, Mr. Wagg said he could see nothing wrong with the practice as long as he was available when needed.

Councillor Parsons suggested that a "break" in the weather had permitted several jobs to be completed, including the paving of Albert and Victoria Sts.

The foreman replied that some projects had been started that should have been left until next year.

Reeve Win Timbers agreed that it had been a poor season to get work done and he felt that under the circumstances, the roads in town were in fairly good condition.

"I Didn't Know It Was Opened" — Case Dismissed

BUTTONVILLE — A little old lady from Willowdale was stopped on the 3rd of September by Markham Township Police and relieved of a 26 ounce bottle of wine. She was later charged with having liquor in a place other than her residence, and her case came up Tuesday in Richmond Hill.

"Sure, I had the bottle in my purse," she insisted, "but I didn't know it was open."

Magistrate Russell Pearce wanted to know how she got the bottle.

"A friend of mine gave it to me to give to my uncle, who is 78. He enjoys a drink now and then. I just put it in my purse, thinking it was sealed. There was only a bit out of the neck of the bottle."

Muriel Marks continued her defense, "I've been married 38 years to the same man. I don't run around. I've only been out of the hospital for a little while and I haven't had a drink for 10 years."

Magistrate Pearce dismissed the charge and warned, "don't let this happen again."

Impaired Rider "Sagging in the Saddle" — Officer

RICHMOND HILL — William McCullum, aged 53, decided to try out his horsemanship two weeks ago, and chose, as his bride path, Yonge Street in Richmond Hill. He was trotting up and down the main thoroughfare, disrupting traffic, when the police moved in.

P.C. Peter Gauslin described the man as he saw it. "He was

sagging in the saddle." McCullum was charged with impaired horse riding, convicted and fined \$50 and costs.

The accused man, who has no fixed address, was definitely impaired according to the police.

He was apparently trying to take the animal to the Honeywell Riding Stables on Yonge Street. The horse belonged to McCullum.

"Was the horse sober?" asked Magistrate Russell Pearce.

Mr. Pearce said that this type of action, may have been common fifty years ago, but today, there was no reason for such antics.

Stewart Rumble, deputy-reeve of Markham Twp., announced on Monday that he will oppose Reeve Chas. Hooper on Dec. 6th. Mr. Hooper intends to seek re-election again. Nominations will be held at Buttonville on Friday night.

Three-Way Bid For Reeveship in Pickering

BROUGHAM — A three-way bid for the position of reeve in the Twp. of Pickering will highlight the Nomination Meeting here on Friday evening. The election is Saturday, Dec. 4th.

Reeve Clifford Laycock will seek re-election for another two-year term. Opposition will come from ex-reeve and County Warden, Sherman Scott and former councillor and municipal employee, Harry Ashton.

For deputy-reeve, Mrs. Jean McPherson could receive an acclamation. It has been reported

however, that Donald Hopkins may toss his hat in the ring and even Harvey Spang, long-time councillor in Ward 1.

Ward 2 councillor, Bill Newman will not be back. Park operator, Geo. Hodgson is a definite candidate. Roger Conant and Henry Westney have also been mentioned.

In Ward 5, councillor Hubert Wank will not seek re-election.

The withdrawal of Donald Gibson from a position on the No. 1 Area Board will leave this position open. Mr. Gibson served as the Chairman in 1965.

Re-Open School at Victoria Square

UNIONVILLE — Two January classes will be operated in School Area No. 2, Markham Twp., immediately following the Christmas vacation period. One will be located in the No. 6 school, south of Victoria Square on the Don Mills Road. It will serve those children whose sixth birthdays fall between Jan. 1 and June 30, 1966.

Transportation will be provided by both the Mortonson and Helse buses, depending on their residence.

A second class will be established in the south-central section for those children residing in the Unionville, Hagerman, Milliken, Marklee, Box Grove,

Locust Hill and Cedar Grove areas.

The mid-term classes will enable many pupils to enter grade 2 in September.

Registration will be conducted on Nov. 29th at No. 4 school and Marklee school from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., or at the Dickson's Hill school from 1:15 to 3:15 p.m. On Nov. 30th, registration will take place at Unionville school from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Birth certificates will be required.

The decision to hold special January classes was approved at an Area Board meeting on Nov. 16th.

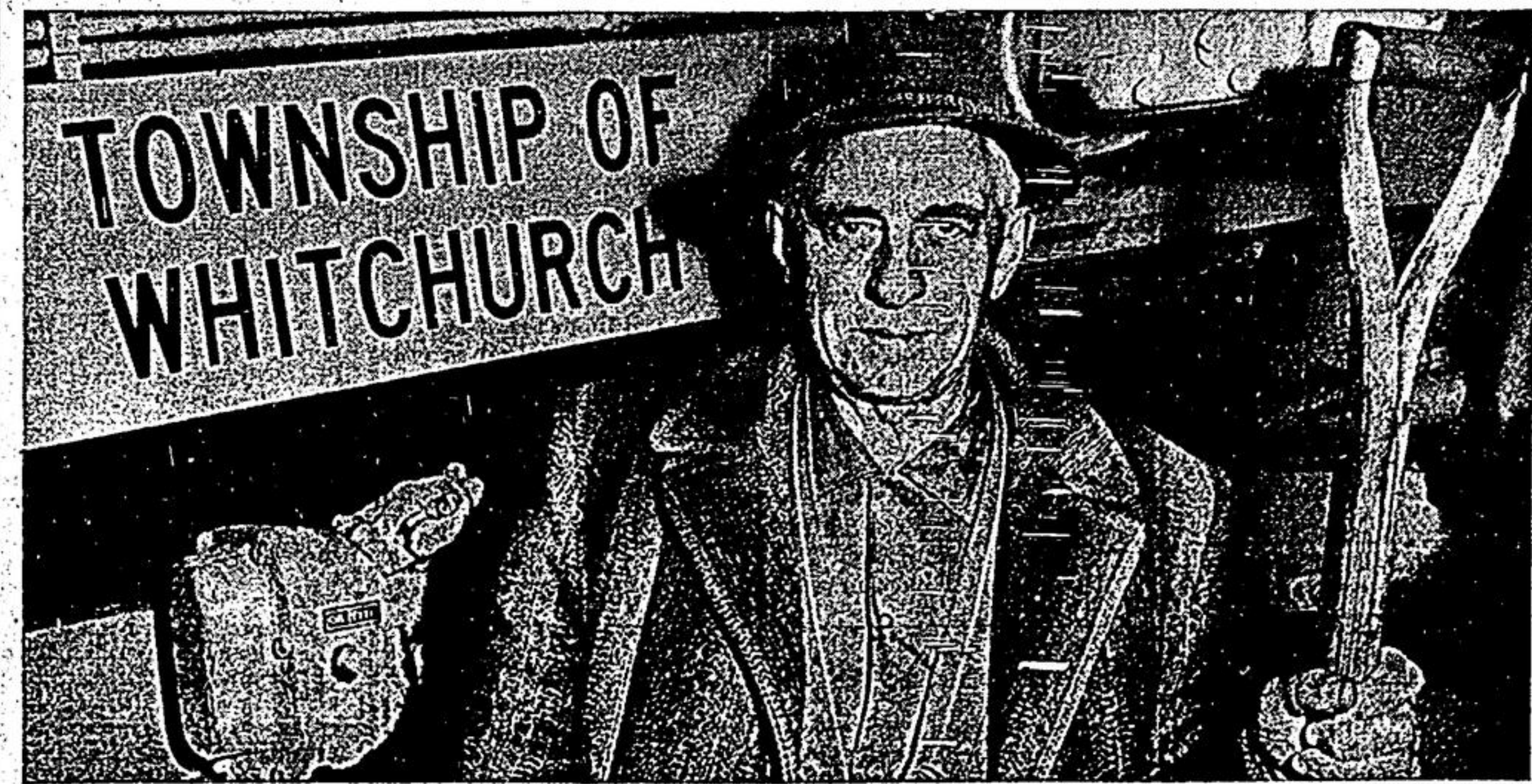
Fined \$300 for Damaging Mailbox
