Out where Nature's in the raw.

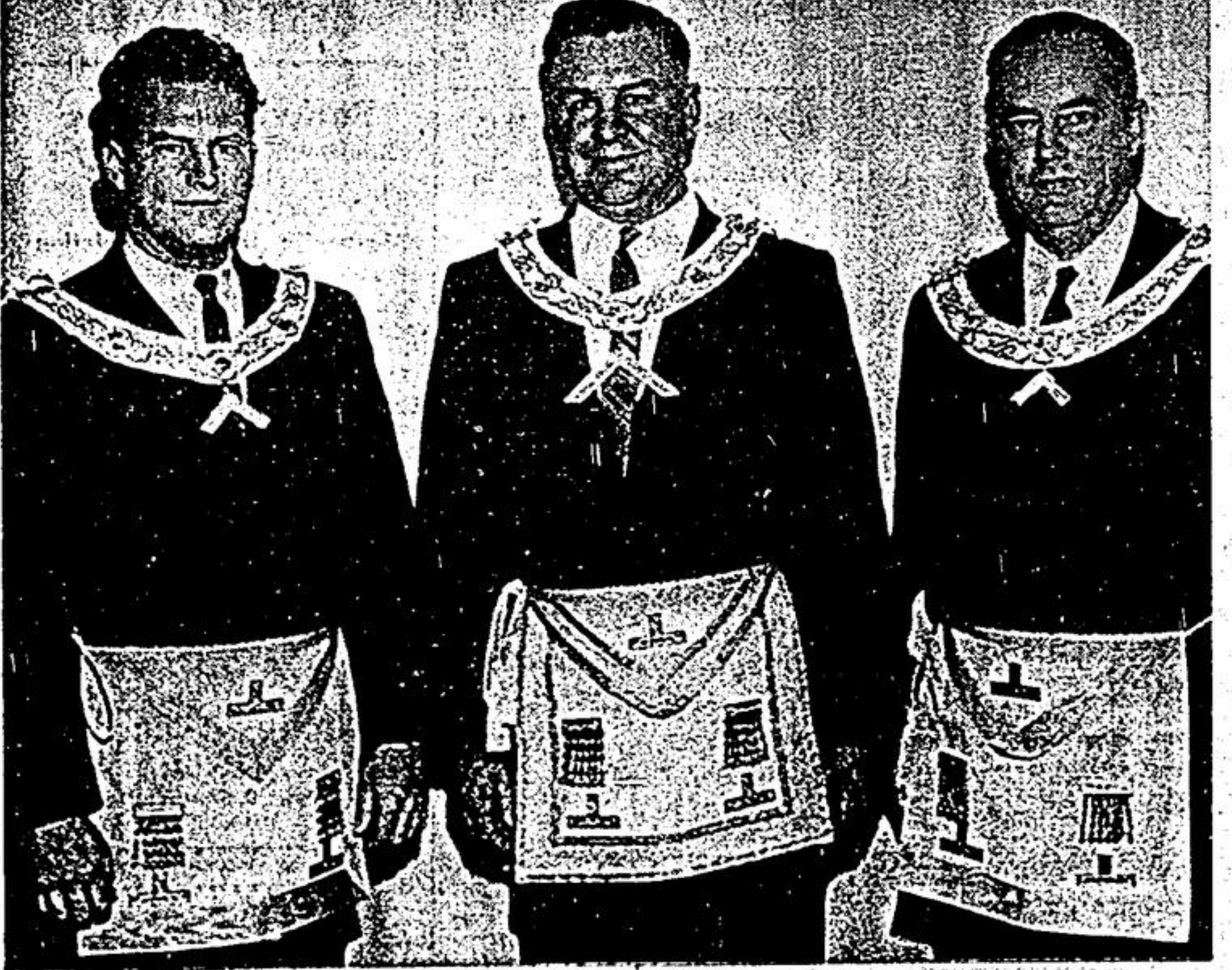
Some, Inventions, Flying, or Science;
