Bible Society Givings Up Hundred Fold Since 1858

In the year 1816 the York Bible Society was formed and became successively known as the Bible Society of Upper Canada, City of Toronto Bible Society, Upper Canada Bible Society and, finally, as it is today, Canadian Bible Society, Upper Canada District.
 The Stouffville Branch of the Bible Society has been in continuous operation since 1852 and possibly even earlier. This was at a time when journeys had to be made on horseback or in the winter, by cutter, and yet dedicated men felt it worthwhile to make these somewhat hazardous trips to encourage the people to give, and give generously, so that the Bible could be made available to people in other lands. This they did, in Stouffville, very generously. In 1858 the sum of 5 pounds was contributed, and this represented quite a sacrifice on the part of some. Contributions have increased more than one hundred fold since that day. The first translation undertaken by the Bible Society, early in the 19th century, was for 2,000 copies of the Gospel of St. John in Mohawk. Since then the work has progressed until, today, the Scriptures have been made available in almost 1,250 languages and dialects.

The Canadian Bible Society provides the Scriptures in Cree and various Eskimo dialects; it distributes in 80 languages in Canada alone; it provides Braille and Talking Book Records of the Scriptures for the Blind; it provides New Testaments for the Armed Forces and for the Police; it supplies every new citizen with a Bible; it supports all Missions seeking its help; Prison and Hospital Chaplains are provided with the Word of God for distribution. In the last week the Bible Society has met \$75.00 of the cost of giving a Braille Bible to a little orphaned blind girl in Korea on behalf of her Canadian Foster Parents who, otherwise, would not have been able to give it to her, they paid \$12.50. Fifty Bibles were given to Fred Nighswander, until recently the Pastor of the Mennonite Church at Altona and who has now gone to work with the Indians at Barwick, Ontario.
 Nevertheless, in spite of the hard work carried out by the Branch Officers and in spite of the wonderful support given in the past, the Bible Society is having a hard time filling the need for Scriptures so very evident in the world today. A campaign was launched, in 1964 to triple world distribution from 50 to 150 million copies a year. This campaign is lagging behind and the Society needs more people to support it. UNESCO has a campaign to make 350 million illiterates literate in the next few years. This, with the normal increase in population means that, every
