In the last week the Bible Society has met \$75.00 of the cost of giving a Braille Bible to a little orphaned blind girl in Korea on behalf of her Canadian Foster Parents who, otherwise, would not have been able to give it to her, they paid \$12.50. Fifty Bibles were given to Fred Nighswander, until recently the Pastor of the Mennonite Church at 'Altona and who has now gone to work with the Indians at Barwick, Ontario.

A campaign was launched, in 1964 to triple world distribution from 50 to 150 million copies a year. This campaign is lagging behind and the Society needs more people to support it.
