# Metro Planning Program Lemonville Candidates Stops At Pickering Townline Says Reeve

BROUGHAM - Living in a municipality next to Toronto is like "trying to keep up with the township's transportation the Joneses." Pickering Twp. Reeve C. W. Laycox told members of the Metropolitan and Region transportation study.

He charged that Metro planning proposals stop at the Metro-Pickering township border, "as if the mutual boundary resembled the Berlin Wall."

The Pickering reeve said his township is in the position of having to pick up where Metro left off in extending transportation easterly.

The Reeve also recommended that the proposed Highway 407 north of Metro be extended easterly to the east limit of the township and eventually connect with the Macdonald-

### Revive Old Plants With Air Layering

It doesn't take long for some house plants to develop that long, straggly, highly unattractive look. By early fall, many look especially leggy.


More often than not, they are removed to some far-away place - the porch, for instance, where they live out the duration of their lives in awkward seclusion. This is the fate of too many good house plants.

produce roots on shorter stalks. Smaller, yet fully developed and attractive offspring result.

Plants most suitably propagated by this method are the erect foliage types such as philodendron, rubber plant, dracaena and dieffenbachia.

Here is how it's done. First. notch the stem where you want the roots to form. Keep the wound open with a foreign object, such as a stick or pebble.
