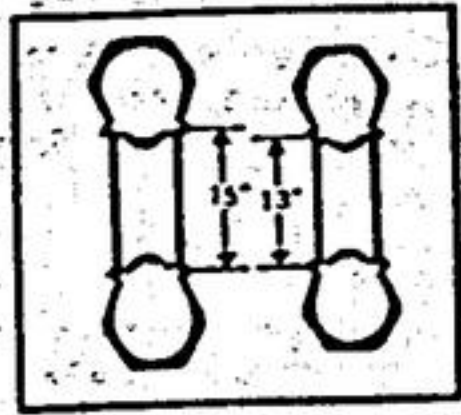
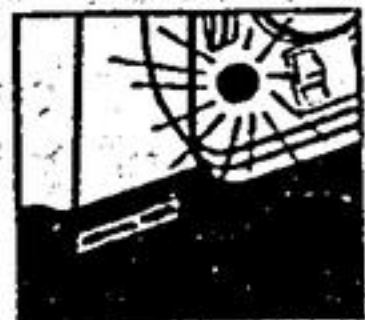

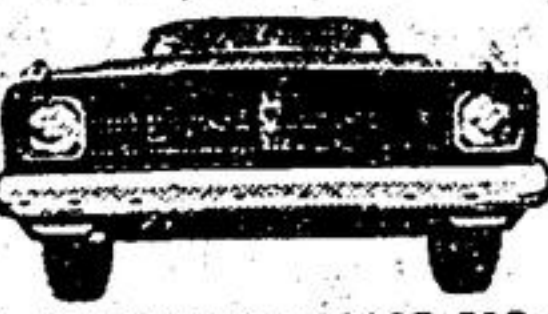
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## "Time For A Change" Stewart Rumble Bids For Markham Reeveship

BUTTONVILLE — Two well known Markham Township residents are contesting the reeve's post at the forthcoming election, Monday, Dec. 6th. Stewart Rumble told a Nomination Night audience here on Friday that it was "time for a change." He has served in the office of deputy-reeve for the past two terms and previously was a councillor for one year.

Incumbent reeve, Chas. Hooper will defend his position. Road committee chairman during the past year, Mr. Rumble said that the 12 mill rate was not sufficient to take care of a costly spring break-up plus the normal maintenance expenditures. "We are now operating on a deficit budget," he said.

He called for a reduction in the number of meetings held by the council since the members are paid on a per meeting basis. "It costs you \$100 every time we meet," he said. "I know it can be reduced." He also urged closer scrutiny of important issues rather than immediate approval without study.

With respect to the Buttonville airport issue, the deputy-reeve said that he had voted with the whole township in mind and not just one particular area. He said that he had opposed the approval of the 9th conc. drag-strip and a recorded vote in the Buttonville Office was proof of his stand on the question.
