**"White House" on
 Main Street Is
 Latest Antique Shop**

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville has a "White House" Not exactly the same size or shape as the one at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, but nevertheless, it's a white house. That's the name of Stouffville's newest antique and art shop that opened its doors to the public last Friday. The sign out front specified "The White House — Antiques — Object D'Art". It's at 233 Main St. West, and impossible to miss. It is a long time dream-come-true for Mr. and Mrs. William Dedlow.

The antique and art shop has taken months of planning and years of collecting, but has finally become a reality. The only thing that was easy was the name of the establishment.

Mr. Dedlow, who is a commercial artist for Gorrie Advertising in Toronto, has always maintained that their home be divided to accommodate an antique shop. Mrs. Dedlow, however, felt that until their four children were older, their "dream" would have to wait. She became interested in antiques about five years ago, and last summer work was started in setting up the business.

Now, the Dedlow living and dining rooms have been transformed into areas of lights, paintings, potteries and hundreds of intricate items. One room has been set aside for antiques, while the second room serves for modern goods and paintings.

Mrs. Dedlow, along with her own pieces, has collected articles from many different dealers. She attended many auction sales throughout the area, and has a number of dealers in Metropolitan Toronto.

In addition, she is in touch with antique importers and now is receiving goods from England, Holland and other European countries.

Some of the articles were purchased from the "Village" in Toronto, and most of these were hand-crafted there. Mrs. Dedlow also has an assorted display of hand-made candles, one of which won first prize at this year's Canadian National Exhibition.

Prices Reasonable
 By checking other antique shops throughout the entire district, Mrs. Dedlow has drawn up a price list that is competitive. In articles purchased through dealers and artists themselves, the price is quoted as a suggested list.

Mr. Dedlow built all the shelves to hold some of the antiques and did most of the carpentry himself. A licensed electrician re-wired the two rooms in order that the large, beautiful chandeliers may be displayed to better advantage.

The conversion didn't hurt the living space as far as the family was concerned. A third room was set aside and turned into their living room.

On hand at the present time is approximately \$5,000 worth of merchandise.

The Dedlow family all think the new shop is "great". They are Karen, 16; John, 13; Patti,

12 and Debbie, 11. Hours of business have not been officially set, but according to Mrs. Dedlow they will be 9 to 6, on weekdays, with late Fridays and all day on Saturdays. The shop will be closed Sunday.

**Garbage Problem Is
 Issue At Whitchurch
 Twp. Nomination**

VANDORF — It was "garbage night" at the Whitchurch Twp. Nomination Meeting here on Friday evening as many ratepayers in the packed Community Hall called for an immediate clean-up of the present practice of garbage disposal within the municipality.

One of the most outspoken on the subject was Marilyn Baker, Stouffville, R.R.2. "I want to tell the people the 'dirtiest' story of all," he said. He said he had no complaint with a proper sanitary land-fill program but he claimed that the property near his residence was a poor location. He charged that the coverage was totally inadequate and seepage would contaminate the water systems in the area. He argued that only garbage from Whitchurch should be accepted. Mr. Baker said he had approached several government officials on the problem but was interested in learning the views of local municipal representatives on the matter. His address was well received by the audience who gave him a rousing ovation. Several others spoke on the same subject.

Reeve Ross Farquharson said that Whitchurch Township could not refuse to accept garbage from Metro in an authorized disposal area. He noted, however, that repeated charges had been laid by the Police Department but had been met with continuous adjournments in the courts. He said that eight cases, now pending, had been adjourned to 1966.
