C. Palmer, S. Gadsby Seek Deputy-Reeve's Post In Markham

BUTTONVILLE — Ward 2 councillor, Cleary Palmer has been hammering away all year on the advantage of Community Colleges and he re-introduced the subject again here on Friday night.

Mr. Palmer accepted a nomination for the position of deputy-reeve. Also in the running for the same post is Mr. Sidney J. Gadsby. A standing-room audience attended the Nomination Meeting.

Mr. Palmer pointed to the many advantages of a Community College in Markham Township or even York County, at no direct cost to the local taxpayer. He said he had discussed the matter with at least 12 ministers at various levels of governments. "It's a project that we really and sincerely need," he said. He asked for public support of his program.

"With the exception of services, it's the most important thing that we need in this township," he said.

He said that he never lost an opportunity to promote Markham's industrial potential and had dealt personally with many interested parties, both at his home and at the Buttonville office.



On The Farm Front... Mathews Jersey Herd Of Gormley Among Best In York County

(A. A. Wall, Agricultural Representative, York County.)

NEWMARKET — Production records are probably the best measure of dairy herd management. Feeding, breeding, and herd health all influence the amount of milk and fat that gets to the tank. Other factors have importance too, but production has to rate at the top.

We have some exceptionally well managed herds in York County, and the B.C.A. system makes it possible to pick out the top producers. For instance, the three Ayrshire herds in York with the highest composite B.C.A., are those of Morley, Cook, Newmarket, R. Johnston, Baldwin and Eric Cradock, Aurora.

Tops in Holsteins are: F. Fieldhouse, Woodbridge, Bruce Snider, Maple and Glenn Atkinson, Schomberg, A. V. & C. L. Gundy of Newmarket have the top producing Guernsey herd, closely followed by Glenville Farms of Newmarket and Fraserdale Farms, King. In Jerseys, the top three are Don Mathews, Gormley, Don Bagg, Woodbridge and K. E. Haas, Woodbridge.

The composite figure for all of these herds range from 130 to 155. Bringing an entire herd up to these levels requires the very best management and they provide a good pattern to follow.

A change being suggested now in the R.O.P. system is that all herds switch to the B plan. There are arguments both for and against this change, but all things considered, I think it is worthy of support.

Daily weighing takes time, labour and adds to costs. Monthly weighing has proven that it is reliable enough. Adjustments can be made to allow for cows that are off their milk when the inspector takes the weight.

Another point is that obviously, many dairy farmers do not want to weight at every milking. There are over 500 dairy herds in York County and only 117 of them are on R.O.P. They could go on the B plan of course but the B plan has up to now, had a sort of second class citizen flavour attached to it.

If monthly weighing was the only system available, testing might be accepted by more herd owners. Reliable records on individual cows is a very valuable guide in making decisions on feeding, breeding and culling. I don't think any dairyman can really be sure that his management is right, without records to work with.
