Plans To Retire Next June

MARKHAM — Only a few steps from his spacious office, Burton J. Newell, Principal of Markham Dist. High School can pause, and for a few brief moments, look to the west through a large plate glass window. He sees the Heated Electrically roofline of a red brick building that fronts on Albert Street. He also sees the beginning of a professional connection that covers a period of more than 21 years. It was his 'second home'.
