Fees Are Heavy In OMB Hearing

KING CITY — Legal fees and expenses cost the Township of King \$4,365.51 in connection with King City's application for incorporation, rejected by the Ontario Municipal Board. R. F. Wilson, of Martin, Day, Wilson and Campbell law firm, was the township's legal counsel at the OMB hearing in October.

The public hearing cost King City police village \$300, the amount required to pay for court reporting.

Advertising the OMB hearing with descriptive boundaries included in the inhabitants application to annex lands to the police village was \$246.40. Total amount of \$46.40 was derived from King City's lands sales account.

The above mentioned invoices are only a small part of the total expenditures.

King City police village taxpayers, in addition to the local costs, will pay one-eighth of King township's bills for the incorporation application.

African Violet Plants Need Special Care

The ever popular African violet or Saintpaulia, a native of the jungles of Africa, likes a warm and humid environment, and is thus fairly well suited to the average home.

The plants cannot tolerate direct sunlight and often have to be shaded during the summer months. This is because they are used to a canopy of jungle vegetation. During the winter months a south window should not present any problems.

Horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture say that watering should be done with care. Watering is best done in the morning, using lukewarm water. Care should be taken not to splash the foliage. Yellow or white spots and circles or streaks on the leaves are caused by drops of water, or by condensation of moisture from the air due to a sudden drop in temperature.

Try to keep the night temperature between 65 and 68 degrees, and about 10 degrees warmer during the day.

Uxbridge PUC Has New Office, Secretary-Treas.

UXBRIDGE — Uxbridge Public Utilities Commission now has a separate business office and a full time, capable businesswoman as Secretary-Treasurer.

The new headquarters for Uxbridge PUC is at 47 Brock Street West, on the northeast corner of Brock and Toronto St.

Miss Ruth Beach, a local resident, who has had an interesting, diversified business experience is in charge of the day-to-day office activities, as Secretary-Treasurer. She is responsible to the Manager, A. C. "Cy" Richardson, for the local utility's business affairs. Mr. Richardson, who is also Manager of Ontario Hydro's Uxbridge Rural Operating Area, handles the outside service for the utility with his staff of Ontario Hydro linemen, foresters and meter readers.

Miss Beach succeeds Miss M. V. Parish who has carried on the dual positions of Chief Clerk for Ontario Hydro's Uxbridge Rural Operating Area as well as Secretary-Treasurer of the municipal utility for the past 7 years. However, the double duties made these continuing tasks very onerous and difficult.

From Local Family

Born at Quaker Hill near Uxbridge, on a farm, Miss Beach attended Uxbridge Public School and is a graduate of Uxbridge High School where she attended for 5 years receiving her Junior Matriculation and also a diploma for the 1 year special commercial course. Miss Beach is a member of a well known Uxbridge family, her father, Oliver Beach, having been a prominent businessman. She is the sister of Stanley Beach, the Chairman of Uxbridge PUC.

After leaving high school Ruth Beach joined the women's branch of the Royal Canadian Air Force. She was posted to St. John's, Quebec for initial training, and later took advanced training in meteorology at Trenton, Ontario. Then she was stationed at Centralia, Ontario, for a year as a meteorological observer. Following this, Ruth Beach served for 3 years overseas at Grostenguln, France, with a R.C.A.F. fighter wing. While there she took training in a second trade, learning accounting.

Is Radio Announcer

During this overseas service, Ruth Beach participated as a part-time disc jockey and announcer for the R.C.A.F. radio station in France. She continued playing sports at which she had excelled in high school, taking part in basketball, softball, girls' hockey and soccer also golfing, skating and tennis.

Returning to Canada in December 1959, Miss Beach

joined the office staff of Duplate Canada Limited at Oshawa in January 1960, in the Payroll Department. Then in the spring 1962, she went to work for North American Van Lines Canada Limited, at Pickering, in the Claims Department and in the Quality Control Department.

When Uxbridge Public Utilities Commission decided to hire a full-time Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Beach applied for the position and was appointed this summer. She has spent the past few months at the Uxbridge Rural Operating Area office, where Uxbridge PUC business affairs had been carried out, in training for the important post of Secretary-Treasurer of the municipal utility.

Uxbridge PUC electric power load has been growing steadily and as the town continues to develop there are now some 1,000 customers and the peak load is about 2,800 kilowatts.
