Dr. J. M. Atkinson said she could not imagine handing over sex education to the primary school system. She said she felt sex education of children should not be left to the school teacher or older children but should be presented to the child by its parents in their own way.

She said sex education should be presented in two terms one on how to protect children from sex deviates and secondly to give them a healthy outlook on sex.

Church Losing Grip

Dr. Atkinson told her primarily female audience the church is losing much of its grip on children with its rules of "don't" and telling children that sex was morally wrong did not help at all.

She said a well adjusted family life is the answer to moral upbringing of children. She said the problem of unwed mothers is such that every mother should at some stage advise their daughters but that this should be at a stage later than grade school.

During a question and answer period, the doctor said if the parents had a good relationship with their child, at age three or four, there is a good chance the relationship would be good at 13 and 14 and at 23 and 24.

She said that a number of good books and films are avail able and parents should not be self conscious when telling their children about the facts of life.




