Fear Foxes Rabid At Cedar Grove

CEDAR GROVE — Two beautiful foxes looped gracefully over our countryside a couple of weeks ago and provided a sight we had not seen for several years in Cedar Grove. With the new game laws below number seven highway, it looked like there may have a winter here. But a worse fate than guns was in store for them. One or both has now been reported as rabid. A check with police and local vets reveals the fact that we are again in the midst of a rabies epidemic. A mild and open winter does no one any real good, it seems. The vet suggested a special warning should be given to farmers so their cattle can be protected and, of course, dogs should have their shots, if they haven't recently. If you see any animal that is acting unlike its normal self, call the police at once. Don't waste a minute; animals lying dead and unknown of rabies are just as dangerous as animals alive with rabies.
