

Fourth Tie In Five Games, Markham Deadlocks Dixie

MARKHAM — The Markham Juniors are discovering that although the games aren't as good as winning ones, they sure beat losses. The Juniors knotted their fourth game in their last five contests Friday night against Dixie. The homesters came from behind to salvage a 4-4 tie.

The tie scores are working another way. They're keeping Markham's loss record down. Including Friday's match, they have not been beaten in their last seven games. Markham has eight wins, five losses and four ties.

Meanwhile, Dixie who has had undisputed possession of the cellar since the season began are beginning to find it's no fun in the basement. Coupled with their tie against Markham, they bombed Brampton 8-0 Sunday night, and are only three points away from putting St. Mike's in the dungeon.

Brampton and Markham are tied for third spot, less than 2 wins of the pace presently being set by Westcliff and Etobicoke.

Two-Goal Lead
