
Over 200 Boys In Action During Minor Hockey Week

Westclair could not be blamed totally for the loss. A number of their best players were sent to Toronto Marlboros for a trial run and failed to make an appearance Tuesday night.


Both clubs were deadlocked at the end of forty minutes of play at two goals apiece. In the final stanza, Markham fired four tallies,

Minor Hockey Week in Canada starts January 22nd. It's one week of the hockey season that is set aside to honour the youngsters that could, perhaps, one day, be playing in the NHL. This year, Canada will recognize a total of 197,163 boys, all under the age of 18. In Ontario alone, 80,744 youngsters fall into that category.

Minor Hockey is a two million dollar business. Besides the minor hockey expenditures, the various affiliates of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Branches collect and expend revenues of their own. Raised by entry fees, gates, grants, draw tickets and cho olate bar sales, etc., they have budgets running as high as the \$16,000 reported by the OMHA. On top of this may be added the almost fantastic amount spent by more than 12,000 teams and by the parents of more than 200,000 boys.

It is conservatively estimated, a financial report stated, that minor hockey players, their parents, their teams and the governing bodies pour much more than two million dollars back into the Canadian economy. Sporting goods stores and factories, gas stations, restaurants, bus companies, arenas and other suppliers benefit from the activities of the thousands of volunteer workers who provide the organization necessary to keep Canadian boys having fun on ice playing Canada's National Sport.

It all boils down to the fact that little kids are big business. In Stouffville, young lads play hockey at the arena Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, in addition to games on other nights out of town. Besides being an enjoyable recreation for them, hockey also provides health and exercise, good sportsmanship, and training to be better Canadians in the future. Hockey is something that should not be taken lightly. Many men and women in this community donate their time to properly organize this sport, so that every youngster has an equal chance to play. Executives are needed; along with coaches, managers, and referees.

It seems to me that if these men can dedicate themselves throughout the winter, then the parents of EVERY boy can set aside one week in which to see their sons play.
