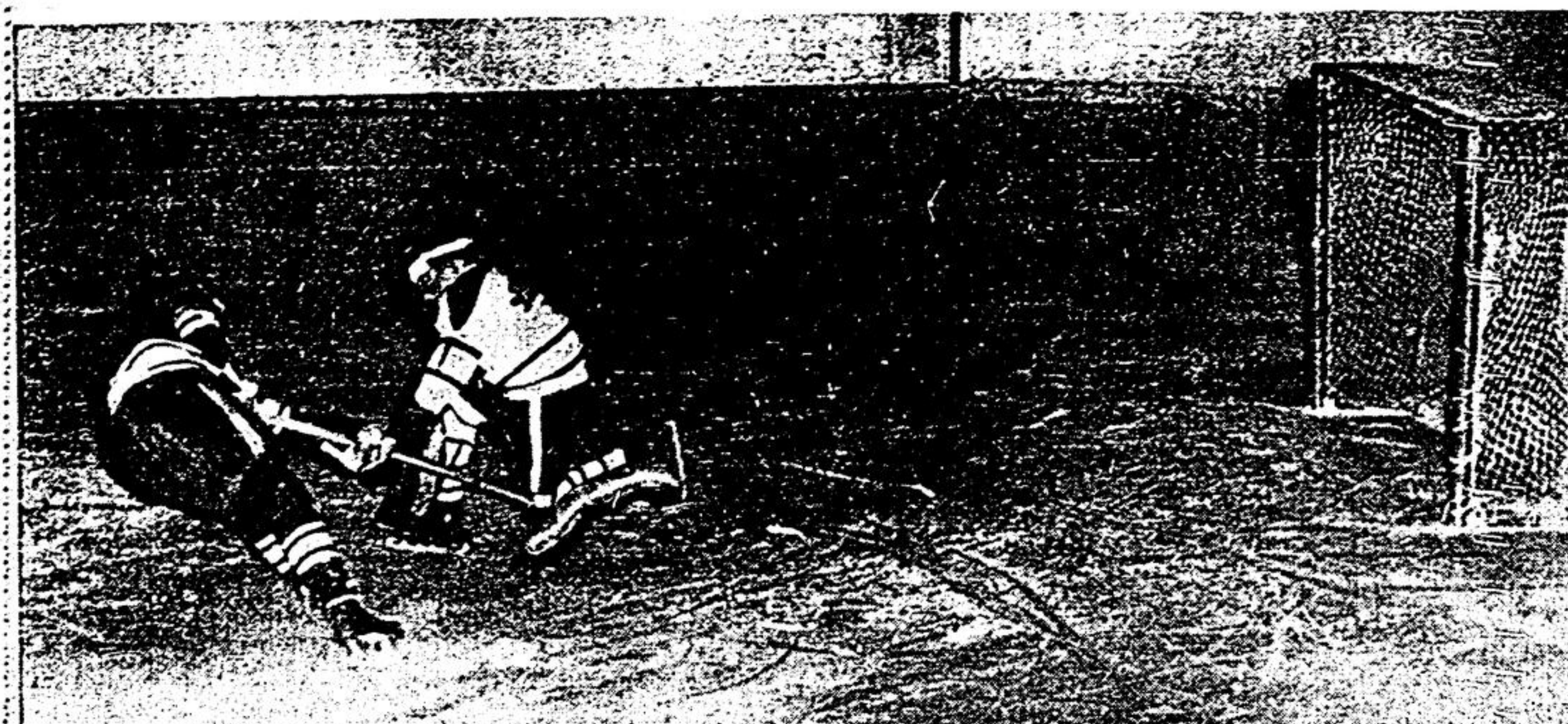


Over 200 Boys In Action During Minor Hockey Week

STOUFFVILLE — Minor Hockey Week across Canada officially begins Saturday, January 22. It is one week of the season set aside to honor, the youth of today, the leaders of tomorrow. Stouffville's Minor Hockey Program will assure both spectators and players plenty of action.

Three nights, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, and more than 10 games await parents and youngsters. All categories of hockey, from the smallest Atom to the largest Junior, will be played.

In addition to the hockey, special prizes will be awarded each night to lucky ticket holders. More than \$175 worth of gifts have been donated by local businessmen.

All this will cost the purchaser one dollar, if he buys the three-section ticket that young hockey players are selling right now. Each section represents one full night of hockey, and each ticket will be divided in half to give everyone a chance at the door prizes. You must, however, be at the arena to claim a gift. Tickets from Monday's gate will be held over throughout the week, with a select few being drawn each night.

This is the one week of the year when parents, friends and relatives of hockey players should donate their time to see the young lads play. A good crowd in an arena may not win a game, but it sure helps make it more exciting.

MARKHAM — After suffering a 9-3 humiliation at the hands of St. Mike's last Wednesday, the Markham Juniors moved back to the winner's circle when they thumped Brampton 5-2 Friday.

The Juniors practised on Friday what they failed to show Wednesday, body contact. St. Mike's took full advantage of the Markham lapse to snow Bob McBroom under a barrage of shots.

On Friday, Markham held Brampton to one goal until the 19:40 mark of the final frame. The homesters scored once in the initial frame, added three in the second period and one in the final twenty minutes.

Roy Hewitt put Markham on the scoreboard in the first period with help from Bruce Andrew and Chris Evans. Jack Gudgeon nullified the tally early in the second period.

Chris Evans, with his first of a two-goal night, fired the second goal to give the homesters a lead that stood all night. Don Mackey and Brian Murphy fired the other goals for the winners.

Ian Orr notched the final Brampton goal late in the third frame.

Fourteen penalties were called, with Markham receiving nine of them.

More than 500 persons attended the game.

In Wednesday's contest, St. Mike's scored five times in the middle stanza to dump the locals 9-3.

Paul McCann, Larry Fullan and Steve Guiliani all fired two goals each to pace the winners. Bill McNeil and Brian Galbraith notched singles.

For Markham, Roy Hewitt, Pete Turner and John Marshall tallied once.

This Friday night, Markham hosts Dixie. Game time is 8:30 p.m.

STOUFFVILLE — If determination could be traded in like green stamps, Stouffville would have had more goals Tuesday night. However, such was not the case.

The 'Clippers' had the chances, but failed in making them count. They lost to Lindsay 7-6.

Stouffville gave up an early one goal lead, then fought back to gain a 2-2 deadlock as the first period ended. Lindsay notched the lone counter of the middle twenty minutes, to set the scene for the high scoring period that was to follow.

The visitors came on strong in the first eight minutes of the final frame, with three goals to lead 6-2. However, the homesters shook off the three tallies, by replying to two of them in the space of 51 seconds. Lindsay added another, and again Stouffville retaliated with two more.

In This Corner

Minor Hockey Week in Canada starts January 22nd. It's one week of the hockey season that is set aside to honour the youngsters that could, perhaps, one day, be playing in the NHL. This year, Canada will recognize a total of 197,163 boys, all under the age of 18. In Ontario alone, 80,744 youngsters fall into that category.

Minor Hockey is a two million dollar business. Besides the minor hockey expenditures, the various affiliates of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Branches collect and expend revenues of their own. Raised by entry fees, gates, grants, drawing tickets and chocolate bar sales, etc., they have budgets running as high as the \$16,000 reported by the OMAA. On top of this may be added the almost fantastic amount spent by more than 12,000 teams and by the parents of more than 200,000 boys.

It is conservatively estimated, a financial report stated, that minor hockey players, their parents, their teams and the governing bodies pour much more than two million dollars back into the Canadian economy. Sporting goods stores and factories, gas stations, restaurants, bus companies, arenas and other suppliers benefit from the activities of the thousands of volunteer workers who provide the organization necessary to keep Canadian boys having fun on ice playing Canada's National Sport.

It all boils down to the fact that little kids are big business. In Stouffville, young lads play hockey at the arena Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, in addition to games on other nights out of town. Besides being an enjoyable recreation for them, hockey also provides health and exercise, good sportsmanship, and training to be better Canadians in the future. Hockey is something that should not be taken lightly. Many men and women in this community donate their time to properly organize this sport, so that every youngster has an equal chance to play. Executives are needed; along with coaches, managers, and referees.

It seems to me that if these men can dedicate themselves throughout the winter, then the parents of EVERY boy can set aside one week in which to see their sons play.
