Veto Gas Application

BUTTONVILLE — A poll of residents, which contradicted one put forth by a representative of Independent Gas. Ltd., has resulted in Markham Township Council turning down an application from the latter to locate in the township.

The company had sought permission to build a 60,000-gallon storage tank for propane gas, plus an office building north of 14th Ave.

Last week, W. G. Coleman, a representative of the company, informed council that he had checked with four residents of the area regarding locating nearby and none of them had objected.

However, last week Clerk H. C. T. Crisp said a check of 10 homes showed eight people against and two abstaining from saying anything.

"It's a different story from the one from the gentleman who presented the application," said Reeve Stewart Rumble.

Said Councillor Allan Sumner: "(In view of the petition) I believe we have no alternative but to inform the company we can't grant a building permit." Council agreed.

Keep Depots Open

BUTTONVILLE — Two railway stations in Markham Township, which were in danger of closing, will remain open after all.

Last week Reeve Stewart Rumble announced that word had been received from the Board of Transport Commissioners in Ottawa that applications from the CNR and the CPR to close down their respective stations in Unionville and Locust Hill, had been dismissed.

Both the CPR and CNR had claimed lack of business as their reason for wanting to shut down.

Township council and local businessmen protested the proposed closings at a hearing held last November.

INQUEST

PICKERING — Pickering Township police said an inquest will be held into the death of William Noble Kendry, 45, of Uxbridge, who was killed instantly, Jan. 28, when struck by a train near Liverpool Rd. No date has been set for the inquiry.

Mr. Kendry, who was employed as a section hand, was apparently thawing out a section of track with a blow torch when he was struck by a westbound Canadian National Railway train.

It is believed he failed to hear the train whistle because of the noise of the torch. His ears were partly muffled from the cold around the trees.

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Markham United Church Approves \$64,000 Budget

Membership Reaches 918

MARKHAM — The congregation of St. Andrew's United Church in Markham has approved a 1966 budget of \$64,000, an increase of \$10,000 over the past year. The annual meeting was held on January 31 following a supper and a short devotional period conducted by the minister, Rev. Albion Wright.

LARGE SUNDAY SCHOOL

Reports showed an increase of 97 in church membership for a total of 918. There were 39 baptisms; 24 weddings and 22 burials during the year. More than 500 children are accommodated in the mid-week youth programs and over 400 attend the Church School. All organizations reported increases in attendance and enthusiasm. were set up and some of their recommendations were as follows: A greater emphasis on work in community organizations and less emphasis on work in church organizations; the establishment of a community counselling service for both teenagers and adults; the need for competent sex education in both church and school as well as in the home; the desirability of giving as much money to outside church work as is spent on local needs. The intention was to adopt a wider interest and concern in community and world needs and less concern for personal requirements.

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Pay For Commission

Members of Markham Township Police Commission will receive \$500 per annum, with the chairman to receive an additional \$100, it was decided at a meeting of council last week.

Members are Judge Garth H. F. Moore, chairman; Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake and Reeve Stewart Rumble. The meeting also agreed to put all property and equipment of the township police into the care and authority of the commission.

The commission, which was appointed November 1, is responsible for the general operation of the police department, setting of policy, rules and regulations, as well as supervising personnel and salaries.

Police Back To School

VANDORF — Sergeant Fred Crawford of Whitechurch Township Police will enroll in a supervisory and command course for four weeks at Ontario Police College at Aylmer February 28th.

Taking courses at the college at present are Police Constable Bill Nelson and Ed Holdsworth. The latter taking the recruit training course.

Sergeant Crawford, who is 28, joined the Whitechurch force May 25, 1964, and was promoted to sergeant January 1 of this year.

Other police constables going to the school will be Darwin Paradis, and Don Hillock, who will take the advanced detective course.

Sergeant Crawford said the courses were taken by the men on a voluntary basis.
