Former Gormley Resident

100 Years Old

During recent months, this aged gentleman had been looking forward to his 100th birthday on March 1. He was a resident of the Nursing Home in Stayner until he suffered a weak spell. On Feb. 20, he was moved to Collingwood Hospital where he passed away on March 2 at the age of 100 years and one day. On his birthday, he was visited by his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Stickley of Gormley as well as other members of his family. That evening, he spoke a few words to his son, Rev. Geo.
