High School Budget Up 4.9 Mills

PICKERING—The Pickering District High School Board budget calls for a 4.19 mill increase to cover the operation of its three high schools.

The budget calls for a mill rate of 22.94 mills in each of the three municipalities. In 1965 the board received 18.75 mills while five years ago the rate was 14.45 mills. Teachers' salaries were blamed for the increase from \$1,033,244 last year to an expected \$1,270,995 in 1966. The board informed the meeting it expected teachers to settle for a \$400 yearly increase and on top of this would be the annual \$300 increment for teachers who had not yet reached the top wage bracket. The board said 18 new teachers would be hired in September.

Total revenue required by the board will be \$2,205,463. The board announced a 1965 surplus of \$32,390, a Pro-

vincial grant of \$1,031,851, night school fees totalling \$4,000 and said they required \$845,985 for current expenses while debenture repayments would cost \$291,236.

Expenditures for the year included \$154,337 for administration costs, \$72,855 instructional supplies, \$162,090 for plant operation, \$19,629 for plant maintenance, \$7,847 for auxiliary agencies, \$116,548 for transportation, \$20,000 in fees to other boards, a capital outlay amounting to \$59,925, debenture retirement amounting to \$291,236 and written off taxes totalling \$5,000. Texts for grades 11 and 12 are expected to cost \$25,000.

Of the totals Pickering Township will pay \$759,436, or 68.78 per cent of the total; Ajax \$322,402 or 28.35 per cent while Pickering Village is expected to raise \$55,382 or 4.87 per cent.

Coroner's Inquest Believe Sectionman Failed To Hear Train

WHITBY—A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest held into the death of a CNR section hand who was sliced in two by a train Jan. 28.

A five-man coroner's jury at the inquest held at the Ontario Provincial Police headquarters in Whitby ruled that William Noble Kendry, 45, of Uxbridge, was killed by accident.

The jurors added that the cause of his death may have been "due to the manner of his dress and adverse weather conditions, and possible fatigue due to long hours of work."

Kendry was struck by a westbound CNR express train on the main tracks west of the Liverpool Rd. overpass. The accident occurred when he was de-icing switch units between the rails.

Kenneth Molaski of Belleville, fireman of the train, told the jurors and coroner Dr. R. S. Irwin that he was driving the 11-unit diesel train at the time of the accident.

"We were travelling about 70 miles per hour at the time. We came around the bend and I saw a man in the middle of the tracks. He was walking away from us."

"I blew the horn, applied the emergency brake system, but he never heard us, we hit him."

Dr. Roland Clark, an Oshawa General Hospital pathologist, said that Kendry was cut in half by the locomotive.

PC James Brown of the Pickering Township Police said that the accident occurred soon after 8 a.m. He said that visibility was excellent, the temperature was at zero, and a strong wind was blowing from the north.

The officer said that the dead man was wearing a hooded parka and a cap with earflaps.

Kendry's foreman, Charles Stone of R.R. 1, Whitby, said that the dead man had been on duty since 7:30 a.m. on the day before his death. He said that because of a snow storm all available hands were needed to keep the trains running.

"This was an emergency situation, we had to keep the switches cleaned so the trains wouldn't be tied up," Mr. Stone said that he could not understand why Kendry did not hear the train.

He added that it was normal practice for two section hands to work together when cleaning switches.

Roy Coppins Was Uxbridge Tp. Farmer

UXBRIDGE—Mr. Roy Coppins, a farm resident for most of his life on both the 4th and 5th concessions of Uxbridge Township, passed away on Thursday, March 17, at the Green Gables Rest Home in Bloomington. He was 76.

Born in Whitchurch, Township, the son of the late William Coppins and Emma Nesbitt, he had taken up residence in Uxbridge town after leaving the farm.

Surviving are three daughters, Mary (Mrs. Jack Stewart) of Scarborough; Margaret (Mrs. Bud Adams) and Ruth (Mrs. Robt. Lynn) both of Toronto and one son, Harold of Whitby. Two brothers, George of conc. 5, Uxbridge, and Herb of Bethany, also survive with one sister, Mrs. Wallace Vaughan of Stouffville.

Mr. Ralph Ingleby of the Goodwood United Church conducted the service from the Low Chapel, Uxbridge, on Saturday with interment
