Shoulder Caress

THE CUT: Shoulder length, or longer, hair cut without feathering, for those flipped up ends.

THE SET: Divide hair in front from a middle part and shape smoothly down to large, rolled down rollers. Roll top crown hair and upper back hair on large rollers too, and finish with a double row of jumbos in the back. Rolled UP, please. Study the diagram.

THE BRUSHOUT: Brush hair down and outward. Then raise the crown hair with a little judicious teasing and from the middle part, smooth two bright wings of hair into bang-like waves and tuck behind ears. Finish by brushing side hair forward, and then finger it into caressing waves, with fly-away ends. Good enough to eat, girl and all.

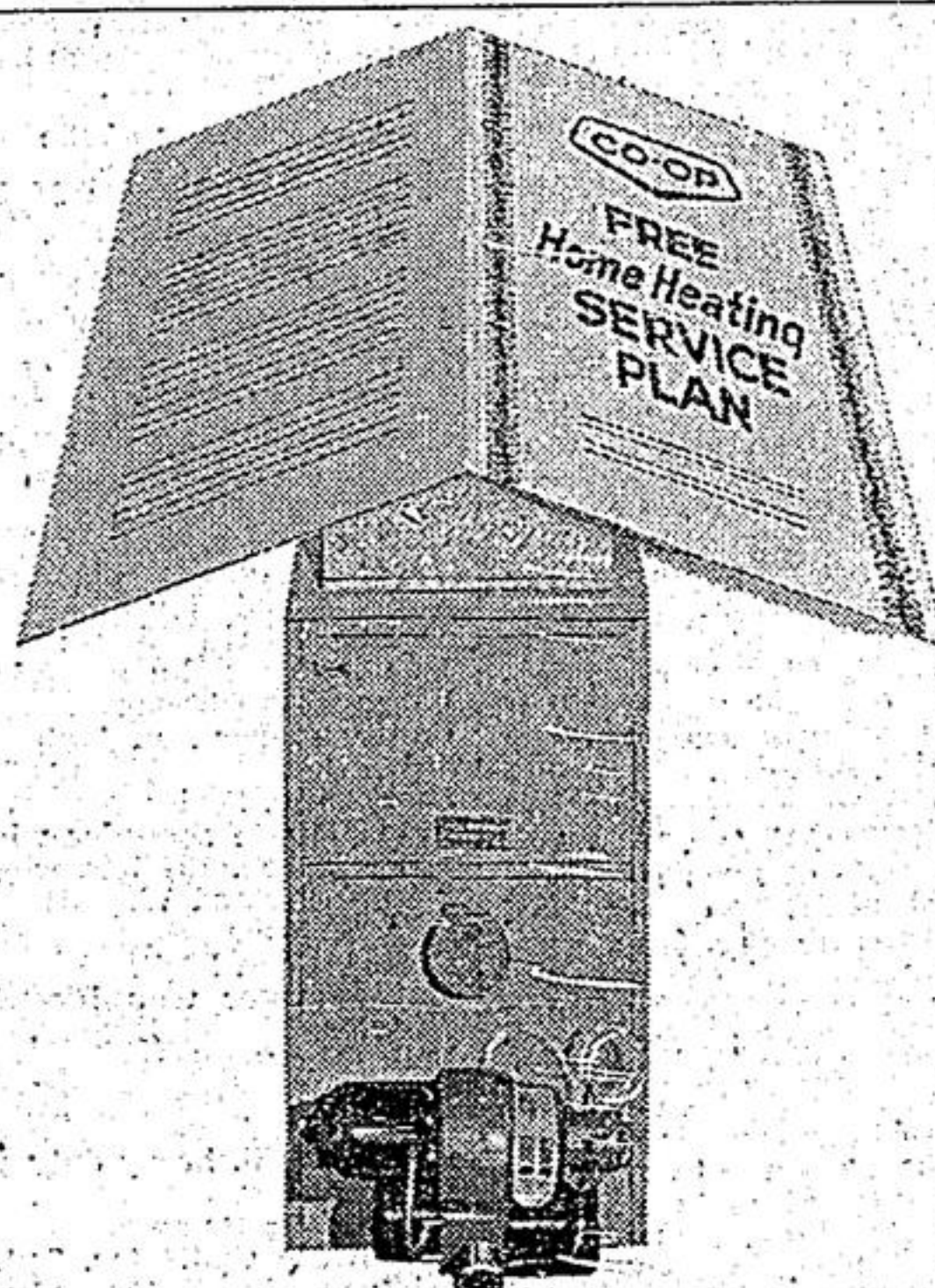
