What Is A Juvenile

Many of you may ask what exactly is a juvenile delinquent. A youthful offender, who has a flagrant disrespect for authority, is called a juvenile delinquent. These adolescents rebel, become hostile, and are usually isolated from most of society.

The main cause of delinquency is the loss of love. Broken homes change many normal teen-agers into hateful, disrespectful delinquents. They are very insecure and are searching for their independence. When they are entirely independent, they believe that they will be able to get along with people again.

There are four main types of juvenile delinquents. The best known type is the true delinquent who is guilt-free, remorse - free, impulsive, and lacks strength of personality. This kind of person may have come from a broken home where the feeling of hate was driven into him. He is now only concerned with himself, satisfying every whim, and ready to do anything so he can stay with the crowd.

The story of a boy named Tom who was sent to a good boarding school because his family was too busy to be bothered with him, presents another type of delinquent, who's behavior is not an unexpected reaction to a bad setting. After a while at the school he began stealing and continued stealing larger items each time until he was finally caught. He then admitted that he didn't need the things he stole, nor did he want to do it, but he just couldn't stop.

Hot-rodging and drug addiction are other examples of delinquency. The Toronto Village is filled with drug-pushers, some even growing marijuana in their back yard, and selling to delinquents who pay a large price for the small thrill they get from it.

Delinquency can start at a very early age. Perhaps it is shown by a child stealing small items from the local drug store, or by hiding another playmate's toy because of jealousy. Actions such as these must be stopped immediately by the parents, before the child

has time to make a habit of it.

Is there any help for these juvenile delinquents? In the case of Tom, a friendly atmosphere in which to develop emotionally is needed. Neurotic behavior can not be cured by punishment or public disgrace. All delinquents need to govern themselves and will respond best to adults who continue to trust them, despite their errors. Adults should not try to show authority and impose needless rules. Love

and understanding is the only way to help juvenile delinquents.

What the future holds for delinquency depends on us for we are the future generation and must strive to help one another.
