Boost Status For More Pay

UNIONVILLE — A dispute arose at the regular meeting of Markham Township School Area Board over the decision to raise the status of two teacher applicants so that they could legally pay them each an extra \$200. The two teachers asked for higher pay than the township salary scale allowed. To get around the problem Chairman Arnold Mortson and personnel chairman, Mrs. Mildred Toogood suggested that the status of the teachers be raised to supervisors which would allow them an extra \$200 each.

Mrs. Toogood was backed up by Inspector Hallman who said that only about one applicant in five was suitable.

Elson Miles and Eldred King, two other members of the Board protested that if something was wrong with the scale it should be looked into but were against creating new positions so they could pay more money. The two particular applicants are a man and wife and Mr. Miles questioned the wisdom of hiring such a combination, particularly for the same school.

On the motion that followed Mrs. Toogood and Stuart Watson favoured the increase and Elson Miles and Eldred King were opposed. Chairman Mortson favoured the resolution, breaking the tie.
