Ambulance Emergency Service?

I have always considered the fire department, police department and ambulances to be emergency services. Webster's dictionary defines emergency as "a sudden, generally unexpected occurrence or set of circumstances demanding IMMEDIATE action." When someone phones the fire department and tells them their house is burning, they don't send a fireman to the scene and then when he confirms the fire—send the fire truck. Yet, this is similar to what happens when there is an automobile accident.

Recently we come to a serious accident east of Coppin's Corners. Two of the victims were lying injured on the road and another two trapped in a car. The accident was reported immediately. Over 20 minutes later two members of our "emergency service" the OPP arrived. The reason for this long delay is because they have to come all the way from Whitby or Brechin to the Uxbridge district. Municipal officers from nearby towns have no authority to come.

They radioed for another "emergency service"—the ambulance which took over ten minutes to come. Con-

No one can assist these people until they are in a hospital.

When the ambulance finally does arrive at the scene it takes at least another 10 minutes to get them to the

hospital. That makes a total of close to 45 minutes before any treatment is given. I shudder to think of the precious lives that are lost because it is too late to help them when they get to the hospital.

Why can't an ambulance and a policeman be dispatched immediately upon request. Surely the archaic law that does not give Municipal officers authority out of their town should be changed—either that or Uxbridge should have an O.P.P. station. It is ridicu-

Pickering Area Board Reports

The Trustee Board of Pickering T.S.A. No. 1 wish to acquaint the ratepayers of the area of the following recent decisions.

1. Contracts have been approved by the Board, for the building of 11 new class rooms, 4 each at Claremont and Greenwood and 3 at Green River, which should be ready for occupation on Sept. 6th next and for which debentures in the amount of \$281,200.00 will be issued. This debt will add approximately 1.2 mills to the local taxes commencing in 1967.

2. Over 70% of the class rooms will comprise one grade only. No class room will have more than two grades. Last year the Board transported pupils in the Almonds, Clover Lane and Hilltop shift to single grade class rooms and never had a complaint because of bussing.

3. It is planned to have 2 junior auxiliary classes, one at Claremont and one at Greenwood.

4. Bus routes will be published prior to Sept. 6th but in general Whitevale pupils will go to Green River, Mt. Pleasant to Greenwood, Altona to Claremont, Atha to Claremont or Green River and all Cedar Creek to Greenwood. Except for the Brougham, Brock Road, Audley shift, all others will be much the same as at present.

5. Parents who have Grade 1 children, who are not now

registered, are asked to contact their present school principal or contact the undersigned at 942-0332. Children must be 6 years of age prior to Jan. 1, 1967 to start Sept. 6, 1966.

6. Your Board has raised the Teacher's Salary Schedule and is demanding higher standards.

MEMO FROM A CAR DEALER

HOW TO LOSE MONEY ON A BARGAIN



During the recent Winter cold spell a dealer friend of mine lost a new car sale to a young couple who bought out of town at a 'saving' of what actually amounted to \$15.00.

The dealer thought no more about it until a few days later when the husband called to say that their new car wouldn't start and apparently had something seriously wrong with it. An examination revealed the engine block was cracked from lack of adequate anti-freeze in the radiator.

How had it happened? The selling dealer in a city some 40 miles away denied all responsibility and claimed the anti-freeze had been checked and that the defect was not his responsibility. The most satisfaction the couple received was an offer to sell the block "if you will bring the car over here." They decided that adding a 40-mile towing charge to what they would have to end up paying for — a new engine block installation — was throwing good money after bad.

While this particular type of trouble may not be commonplace, similar cases of other "pre-service" neglect, unfortunately, are. It was plainly evident that the dealer with the "bargain" price was cutting costs in simply not installing any or sufficient anti-freeze in his cars or neglecting to check them thoroughly.

Who is to blame? Well, the dealer who sold the car primarily. But what about the young couple who were prepared to deal anywhere for the lowest bid? There is some point to the argument that they really got what they paid for.
