Modern School Of Today Compared To Yesteryears By Uxbridge Reeve

GOODWOOD — "Today, you have a school that has everything, but never forget that someone must pay for it," warned Reeve Alvin Redshaw of Uxbridge Township on Thursday night.

It was the official opening of a new \$125,000 five-room addition to Goodwood Public School and a large gathering of both resident ratepayers and visitors were present for the occasion.

Addressing his remarks to the pupils present, Mr. Redshaw urged the boys and girls to take full advantage of all opportunities afforded by improved facilities. He recalled the days of his youth when, forty years ago, he attended a one-room school with eight grades and outside plumbing. "We had to walk 40 rods to get a drink of water," he said. The reeve cut the red ribbon, assisted by board chairman, Harry Harper and former trustee, Peter Barnhardt.

The Prayer of Dedication was pronounced by Mr. E. R. Ingleby. Words of appreciation were extended by board member, Donald Kennedy.

Honour Claremont Pastor After Fifty Years Service

CLAREMONT — Sunday, June 5, Dr. H. S. Hillyer of Claremont Baptist Church will celebrate his 50 years of preaching. It was the first Sunday in June 1916, that Dr. Hillyer, then a young student minister, preached his first sermon in the Baptist Church at Clarenceville, Quebec. Since then he has led a varied and interesting life. In 1921 he was ordained in the First Baptist Church at Dunnville, Ontario. The next year, 1922, he married and he and Mrs. Hillyer left for Bolivia, South America, where they remained for 25 years. There he preached to his congregation in their own language, Spanish. He also edited two publications and wrote two books, published in Spanish. He established the Southern Cross Radio Station in Bolivia, which is still operating. In

1947 Dr. and Mrs. Hillyer returned to Canada, and the Doctor continued his preaching, this time in English. Both Dr. and Mrs. Hillyer are world travellers, being especially familiar with Africa and Asia. At special services in the church on Sunday, Dr. Hillyer will speak at 11 a.m. In the evening at 7:30 Rev. Gordon Jones of Blythwood Baptist Church, Toronto, who is regarded as one of Canada's outstanding speakers, will be in the pulpit. To Dr. Hillyer goes our best wishes for many more years of health, happiness and good preaching. A reception, arranged by the Board of Deacons of the Baptist Church, will be held in the new Canadian Legion Hall from 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday, June 4, in honour of Dr. and Mrs. Hillyer. All friends and neighbours are cordially extended an invitation to attend.
