Convicted Of Break And Entry

BUTTONVILLE — Geo. E. Quinney celebrated his 28th birthday Tuesday in custody of the law, charged with break and enter. His case, heard Tuesday morning, resulted in a conviction, adding to his lengthy twelve year record.

Quinney was charged June 16 by Markham Township Police only two months after he was released from serving an 18 month term in penitentiary.

The accused admitted, in a written statement, that he broke into the premises of Thornleigh Wood Products on Observatory Lane in Richmond Hill. Detective Douglas Tribbling of the Markham Township Police told the court that a screwdriver was missing from the building, but it was located later on the premises. The officer testified that a sliding door was opened and a window removed enabling the accused to gain entry to two parts of the building. Quinney apparently used the screwdriver to force the window.

The accused, who lives in Richmond Hill, explained to the court that serious domestic problems prompted him to break into the building. He said that his wife and two children had left him when he returned from the penitentiary. Quinney underwent a mental examination in 1959. Magistrate O. S. Hollins registered the conviction, then remanded sentence for one week.

Centennial Project Progress Report

BUTTONVILLE — Early in April, the Centennial Committee of the Township Council composed of Councillors Roman and Hoover, and chaired by Mr. Roman, presented a report to Council recommending that the Centennial project of the municipality should be the building of a Centennial Library in Unionville. That up to \$100,000.00 would be made available for that purpose. It was pointed out that this project was chosen because it was felt to be the desire of the people of the Township and that the amount of money to be received from grants now and in the future for this project surpassed grants available for other projects.

The Township Council adopted the recommendation on April 18th, handing the project over to the Township Library Board with the instruction that it would be desirable to have this first phase of library development on a township-wide base to be operative by March of 1967.

The Township Library Board had been formed early this year. Mrs. Arthur Toogood of Unionville was appointed as Chairman, Mrs. F. Aimee of Thornhill acts as Secretary and Miss Jane McLaren, also of Thornhill, is the Treasurer. Other members of the Board are Mr. Philip Mihorean of R.R.2 Markham, Mrs. J. Russell and Mrs. G. E. Donnell of Unionville, Mr. G. Zinkun of Thornhill and Reeve Stewart Rumble.

The Library Board has held eight meetings since its formation. It has studied the problem of providing library service for ALL the citizens of Markham Township and had decided that a central library in Unionville was a logical first step. Negotiations are now under way with the Thornhill Public Library to provide free library service to the residents of Markham Township who would most logically use this library because they live nearby.

The site for the Centennial Library has not as yet been acquired but negotiations are well along. The architectural firm of Hicks, Marsh and McLean has been engaged to draw plans and will proceed as soon as the boundaries of the site are known.

The idea of the yearly cub group camping trip was to provide a basis for boys entering scout troops and also to further their knowledge of woodcraft.

The Council felt that township roads were not adequate to be used for this purpose.

TUBED TREES

Normal School Class Of 1916 Anniversary Reunion

CLAREMONT — A once-in-a-lifetime reunion was held in the Claremont Conservation Park last week when teachers from the Toronto Normal School class of 1916 gathered together to renew acquaintances and talk over old times.

There were 273 graduates of that year and it marked the first time that living members had been reunited in a period of fifty years. The Master of Ceremonies was Mr. John H. Lang. Each of the teachers was given an opportunity to address the gathering and many paid tribute to the Normal School Principal of that day, Mr. William Scott. Pickering Area Inspector, Mr. J. C. McClelland of Whitby was a guest on the program. He read from the minutes of the Teacher's Institute of 1899 that revealed study courses under consideration then that are still in the discussion stage today. He touched briefly on the passing of the one-

room rural school. "What really happened," he explained, "we couldn't obtain teachers of your calibre to teach in them any more." A check of the Toronto Normal School register of June 1916 reveals the following names of local interest: Gertrude Aikenhead, Richmond Hill; Barbara H. Armstrong, Mt. Albert; Vera Barnes, Bloomington; Violet J. Boyes, Pickering; Helen Burling, Pickering; Gertrude Deacoff, Sharon; Lila Doan, Quessville; Mary A. Forsyth, Stouffville; Ada Geeson, Unbridge; Arlie Harrison, Mt. Albert; Mary B. Honey, Lemonville; Charlotte Johnston, Ashburn; Irene McMahon, Richmond Hill; Wilhelmina Oldham, Mt. Albert; Grace Pratt, Richmond Hill; Fannie Raymer, Markham, R.R. 1; Nellie Smith, Quessville; Milton Pegg, Claremont; Russel J. Pike, Bethesda; and Joseph Teasdale, Aurora. Of the 273 graduates, 26 have passed on. Two were killed in overseas service during World War I.
