



On Friday, October 14, the recently completed 34-room addition to Pickering District High School will be officially opened by Honorable William G. Davis, Minister of Education. The total cost of the project, including equipment, exceeded two million dollars.

Minister Of Education To Open Pickering High School Addition

PICKERING — The new addition to the Pickering District High School will be officially opened by the Honorable William G. Davis, Minister of Education, Oct. 14.

There are 34 rooms in the added wing, bringing the total number of rooms in the school to 59. In addition to 16 classrooms designed for maximum flexibility there are shops and labs to permit a more diversified choice of

courses for students as well as a double gymnasium.

The total cost of the building, including architect's fees and equipment, was \$2,153,108. Of this \$1,178,018 was borne by the federal and provincial governments. The remaining \$975,090 was shared by the Township of Pickering, the Town of Ajax and the Village of Pickering.

Council Approves New Ward Boundaries

BROUGHAM — A bylaw setting new boundaries for wards in Pickering Township passed almost without discussion Monday night but a battle appears to be shaping up when it goes before the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

When Councillor Ronald Chatten chided Reeve Cliff Laycox for the speed with which the vote on the bylaw was taken, Reeve Laycox said objections can be voiced at an OMB hearing the date of which won't be set until some opposition is registered. At this Councillor John Campbell said, "Oh, it will."

NEW BOUNDARIES
Under the new bylaw Ward 1 includes lots 21 to 35 in Concessions 1 to 9 except the part of Concession 1 south of Highway 401. Ward 2 includes the remaining part of the township north of Highway 401 plus the part south of 401 east of the town of

Ajax. Ward 3 will comprise lots 13 to 22 in the part of the township south of Highway 401 in Ranges 2 and 3 and Concession 1. Ward 4 will be all lots south of 401 from 23 to 29. Ward 5 will be lots 30 to 35 south of Baseline Rd.

The new boundaries, if approved, change the areas so that Ward 1 has a population of 5032 instead of 2486. Ward 2 will be adjusted up to 5175 from 2217; Ward 3 down to 6188 from 10,145; Ward 4 down to 4048 from 4436, and Ward 5 down to 5117 from 6276. Ward 4 is expected to grow by about 1,500 by the beginning of 1967.

In a recorded vote Councillors Donald Beer and Harvey Spang, Deputy Reeve Jean McPherson and Reeve C. W. Laycox voted for the bylaw. Councillor Ronald Chatten, John Campbell and John Williams were opposed.

Yes, but . . . and there are some important buts. If his service stalls are busy with his regular customers and you bought your car somewhere else, he is likely to service his regular customers first. You can't blame him.
