Holden Beats Aurora

STOUFFVILLE — Jody Holden scored both touchdowns as the Stouffville District High School football team defeated Dr. G. W. Williams Secondary School, Aurora 13-6, in an exhibition game at Stouffville. The opening touchdown was scored on a 65-yard pass from quarterback Bruce Mehaffey in the first quarter. The convert attempt by David Forsyth was blocked. Holden crossed with the second touchdown on a nine yard running play in the second quarter. David Forsyth's convert made the score 13 for Stouffville. Aurora counted one unconverted touchdown.

The rushing star of the game was David Forsyth with 78 yards in 12 carries. Jody Holden carried 53 yds. in five tries. Bruce Mehaffey averaged seven yards in five carries. He also completed two of the three passes for 85 yards including a 65 yard touchdown pass. David Forsyth, Paul Forsyth and Harold Crowder were outstanding on defense for Stouffville.

My first interview is with Mr. N. Fekete. Mr. Fekete was born in the city of Torqu-Mures in Roumania. While growing up in his na-

live town, it changed hands several times, belonging either to Hungary or Roumania.

Mr. Fekete attended Rezele Ferdinand University of Cluj, Roumania, and received his doctor's degree at the Faculty of Political Science and Law.

This is Mr. Fekete's first year of teaching in Stouffville but he has previously taught eight years; five years in Roumania and three years at a Protestant High School in Gaspe, Quebec.

This year he teaches seven classes of French to grades 9, 10 and 12.

BRAIDS AND RIBBONS IN YOUR HAIR
A Great Look With Your Brass Buttoned Suit
CUT: Short or long, makes no difference because fake braids really work better.
TO SET: Tape bangs over a fat wad of cotton. If hair is short, tape bang hair in place. Then place three 1/2 inch rollers across the crown as in diagram.
TO COMB: Brush bangs in place and then tease some fullness at the crown. For long hair, part hair at center back, pull up to sides and twist into fat pin curls. Makes a marvelous anchor for fake braids. Do the braids in a complete loop and secure at sides of crown.
Trim with flying red, white and blue striped ribbons.
