Switches Vote; Lot Fee Charge Approved

BROUGHAM — Both women and councillors have the right to change their minds and councillor Norman Waller altered his stand, Monday night on the controversial \$500 lot fee charge in Pickering Township. He asked that it be retained and the vote carried 4-2. Deputy-reeve, Mrs. Jean McPherson and councillor Harvey Spang were opposed. Councillor Donald Beer was absent.

Two weeks ago, the charge was withdrawn on a 4-2 vote of council. At that time, Mr. Waller favoured its withdrawal.

Councillor Spang charged that the fee was unfair to residents who wished to separate a single lot and build a retirement home.

Councillor Waller suggested that the lot fees be used to install water and sewers in industrial areas to promote more industrial assessment and support heavy educational costs now being carried through residential taxation.

Voting in favour of the \$500 fee were, Reeve C. W. Laycox and councillors Ronald Chatten, John Williams and Waller.
