Approval Granted

CENTENNIAL PROJECT

Remove Old Firehall Re-locate Town Clock

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville will have a centennial project.

Government approval was received this week for a grant to cover a portion of the cost of renovating the exterior of the present Municipal Building and re-locating the historic town clock at this site. The old firehall will be demolished.

Although the road will not be closed as proposed earlier in a private sketch plan, a Civic Square effect can be attained through proper landscaping and the installation of a fountain. Architect, Alexander Leman of Toronto who designed the interior of the administration offices and council chambers, will prepare plans on this project. Reeve Ken Laushway who announced the project's approval, Tuesday, declined to place an estimate on the cost. He admitted, however, that he had submitted a rough sketch of his personal plan to the government's centennial committee at Queen's Park and, after several meetings of both provincial and federal representatives, the idea was approved.

"Even at this late date, I still say that Stouffville will have as good if not better centennial project and program than any other community around," he said.

Howard J. 'Pat' Malloy

Was Town Resident 77 Years

STOUFFVILLE — Funeral service was conducted Tuesday afternoon for Howard J. Malloy, a resident of Stouffville for the past 77 years. Mr. Malloy died Sunday morning at the Brierbush Hospital. He would have been 91, Jan. 15.

Howard or 'Pat' as he was known to almost everyone in town, was a walking history of Stouffville. Puffing on his familiar cigar, he enjoyed nothing more than discussing the 'good old days' with his friends in 'Shine Davis' tobacco shop or pulling galley proofs at The Tribune, for many years, his second home.

'Pat' Malloy, was a printer by trade, coming to Stouffville with his parents in 1889 from Forest, Ontario. The Tribune was still in its infancy when his father, William took it

over. There were two papers in town at the time and Stouffville's population was 1,200 people. The Tribune plant was then located on the site of Telf Rennie's home, Church and Main Streets.

LODGE MEMBER
Mr. Malloy was a member of Richardson Masonic Lodge, Stouffville and in May, 1966, was presented with his 50 year Jewel. He also belonged to the Odd-fellow's Lodge, No. 384 and York Encampment, No. 112.

Surviving is one son, William of Stouffville and a daughter-in-law, Virginia of Willowdale. There are seven grandchildren, Marlene, Yvette, Marianne and Dorian Malloy of Stouffville and Larry, Jim and Lorne Malloy of Willowdale.

Rev. Douglas Davis conducted the service from the O'Neill Chapel, Stouffville with interment in Stouffville Cemetery. The

Mrs. Joyce Spenseley will act as Secretary. Other club representatives have agreed to committee appointments but could not attend. Stouffville Council was represented by Reeve Laushway and Councillors Jim McKellar and Tom Longgan. Each committee member will organize sub-committees within their organizations and sponsor centennial events throughout the year. The assistance of residents not connected with a particular group, is also requested.

Chairman Boadway called for the full co-operation of the entire community to make the program a success. The next meeting will be held, Monday evening, Dec. 19 at 8 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

STOUFFVILLE — An outbreak of rabies in the 7th concession area of Whitchurch Township, has caused the death of two more animals.

Two 'Ayrshire' heifers died last week on the Ira D. Ramer farm, managed by Leslie Dunk. Nineteen

others have been placed under quarantine. A rabid fox has been blamed. Mr. Dunk and three other men, Gordon and Harold Willieys and John Post are all receiving anti-rabies shots at the Stouffville office of Drs. Mitchell, Smith and Graham.

STOUFFVILLE — The best Christmas presents several Stouffville families could receive would be news of a strike settlement at Canadian Line Materials Limited in Scarborough.

Settlement could very well come soon, possibly Thursday evening (tonight) when a ratification meeting will be held with company employees.

The Tribune has learned that a tentative agreement between the union and the firm was reached following negotiations, Monday. Both sides had to give a little," said a spokesman for the workers, "if the agreement is approved, we could be back at work by the first of next week." About 300 employees are affected, including many

from the Stouffville-Markham area.

Markham Returns Laidlaw

MARKHAM — In a turnout at the polls of only 38.6 percent, Markham Village re-elected its deputy-reeve, two councillors and four school trustees, Saturday. The lone incumbent candidate to be defeated was P.U.C. member, Howard Cosburn. He lost out to newcomer, Donald McNabb by 109 votes. Joe

Fry, no stranger to municipal affairs, headed the Utilities poll with 820. Arthur Bonner trailed with 433.

With reeve Alma Walker returned by acclamation, much of the election interest was focussed on the position of deputy-reeve. Albert Laidlaw was successful in defending his post but it was a close fight right down to the wire. He edged out builder, Douglas Meharg by 13 votes. Mr. Laidlaw counted 719 to 706 for Mr. Meharg. A recount may be requested.

STILL POPULAR

Public School Principal, Lloyd Abernethy, who in 1964 polled the largest vote ever accorded a councillor candidate, retained his popularity on Saturday with a return of 1,079. Douglas Allison was re-elected with \$88, followed by Rod Stewart with 855. Mr. Stewart fills the post made vacant through the resignation of councillor Paul Horton. Keith Brown (552) and William Hall (218) were unsuccessful.

LADY LEADS
Mrs. Merna Colbourne was the top candidate for school trustee with a vote

count of 1,092. Donald Sim was runner-up with 1,067; Robert Dorey, 973; John Dunsford, 821; Walter Grievce, 800 and Gilbert Davis, 684. Ray McPhail failed in his bid for school board with 392.

Clerk Howard Graham attributed the light vote to the poor weather. With reference to the possibility of a recount, he said that Mr. Meharg had 14 days in which to file an application.

Fox Attacks Dog; Shot By Farmer

RINGWOOD — A fox, believed rabid, attacked a German Shepherd dog, Friday, on the farm of Russell Smith, near Ringwood. Mr. Smith stunned the animal with a plow stake, then shot it in the head.

The fox had been lying under the Smith car not far from the house, when it suddenly lunged at the

family dog. Mr. Smith was able to separate them but not before the dog had been bitten. It had received anti-rabies shots but will still be quarantined for a period of three months.

The fox head has been sent to the Weston laboratories of the Department of Lands and Forests but results of tests have not been revealed.
