Abe Lehman
Town Resident
Half Century

STOUFFVILLE — Residents of Stouffville paid their final respects to one of the town's most highly-respected citizens when funeral service was conducted for Abraham 'Abe' Lehman on Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Lehman, 85, passed away in York Manor, Newmarket on Sunday.

Mr. Lehman was everybody's friend. He was never too busy to say hello and his cheery whistle could be heard a half-block away. Born in Markham Township at conc. 7, the son of Elias Lehman and Fanny Grove, he moved to Stouffville 50 years ago. He attended school at Dickson's Hill and Mongolia.

Mr. Lehman operated a produce delivery service to Toronto, beginning in 1906 with a horse team and wagon. He purchased his first truck in 1918. He could recall eggs at eight cents a dozen and wages at \$6.00 a month. His wife, the former Margaret Ann Harper died, four years ago.

Mr. Lehman was a member of the Stouffville Christian Church and a former Superintendent of the Sunday School. He belonged to the Stouffville Odd-fellow's Lodge, a membership he retained for 50 years. A special Lodge service was held on Monday evening.

Surviving are three sons, Garland and Donald of Stouffville, Mervin in Toronto and two daughters, Viola (Mrs. Telf Rennie), Stouffville and Nelda (Mrs. Jack O'Neill) of Belleville.
