American Breeders Service Purchases Four Don Augar Bulls At Auction Sale

American Breeders Service, Inc., of De Forest, Wisconsin represented in Ontario by David R. Weddel of Queensville, excited the Holstein World by purchasing at a public auction on December 17, 1966, the four sires that headed the great Don Augar Holstein Herd at Northford, Connecticut.

This herd was the highest producing herd in the U.S. for five out of the last seven years with a current HIR average of 21,933 M. 3.7% 821 BF, for 35 records.

Don Augur Mothermarts has PROMIS and Don Augur Mothermarts PRIDE, two brothers out of the grand old brood cow in

the herd, sold for \$108,000 each to American Breeders Service. This price set a new record for a Holstein bull sold at auction.

American Breeders Service also purchased Don Augur True Type MODEL for \$70,000 and Don Augur Wis IDEAL for \$30,000. The tremendous sale average for the more than 70 animals sold was \$8,719, more than twice the former record for a dispersal on the North American continent.

More than 7,000 apples varieties have been named but 12 account for 85% of the production in North America.

Predict Lower Prices

Canadian Department of Agriculture economists predict lower prices in January for eggs, pork and carrots, with potatoes selling below year-earlier figures because of ample supplies. There may be a decline in broiler prices but apples are firm and beef will likely cost more. Here is the itemized food outlook:

EGGS: The present downward movement of prices is expected to continue as supplies increase.

BROILER - CHICKEN: With a seasonal build-up in supplies, no price increase is expected and there may be some decline.

PORK: Marketings of pork, which have been increasing are expected to continue to rise and the easing of prices will likely continue.

BEEF: With decreasing supplies of beef, prices are expected to be firm or higher.

APPLES: Somewhat heavier supplies are available at prices which are little changed.

POTATOES: Potatoes are plentiful and of high quality with prices considerably below those of last year.

CARROTS: Plentiful supplies of good quality carrots are available at lower prices.

Mr. Blackburn said government insurance offers farmers protection of up to 80 per cent of their normal yield at about half of the actual cost.

The policies are sold by private insurance agencies on a commission basis. The Canadian Govt. makes a contribution of up to 25 per cent of the farmers' premiums and the Ontario government pays five per cent and administration
