Major Accident Rate Tops '65

STOUFFVILLE - There were 69 major accidents in Stouffville during 1966 according to figures revealed this week by Police Chief Orland Keating. This is 27 more than in the previous year and 39 more than in 1964. Collisions in 1966 where damage was less than \$100 totalled 28. THREE IN ONE DAY Police were called to investigate three accidents on New Year's Day. Damage totalled \$1,150. The most serious crash occurred on Park Drive South involving cars driven by W. T.
