Federal Loan Approved For Sewage Plant

Approval of a \$16,667 federal loan for a sewage treatment project in Aurora, had been announced by the Honorable John R. Nicholson, Minister responsible to Parliament for Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Provided under National Housing Act, the loan is for a period of 20 years with interest at 6 1/4 per cent per annum and is based on an estimated cost of \$25,000.

The loan will assist the town to convert and enlarge the present sewage treatment plant.

For work completed on or before March 31, 1970, CMHC may forgive repayment of 25 per cent of the principal amount of the NHA loan and 25 per cent of the interest that has accrued in respect to the loan as of the date of completion of the project.

Clarence Cole is home from Ajax-Pickering Hospital where he had been confined for three weeks.

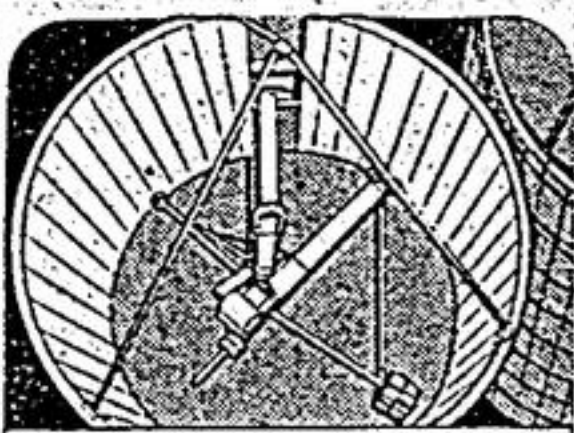
