Village Of Stouffville

By-law #647 for the Corporation of the Village of Stouffville requires residents to have snow removed from sidewalks abutting their property by 10:00 a.m.

By-law #866 prohibits all night parking on streets in the Village of Stouffville. Owners of vehicles are requested to co-operate to facilitate the clearing of streets.

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The magic figure, according to government highway authorities who make a continuing study of the subject from year to year, is 17.91 miles per gallon.

This is based on passenger cars only which travelled an average 9,421 miles while consuming 526 gallons of fuel. Almost half of the driving was done in cities.

The addition of trucks and buses to the total dropped the average to 15.50 m.p.g. Passenger cars amount to 85 percent of the vehicles on the road.

In a study of where most gas wastage originates, research engineers made numerous tests using eight-cylinder sedans with automatic transmissions. The cars weighed 4,000 to 4,175 pounds and were driven at various speeds on level, straight and hilly-type roads.

Ideal speed for fuel economy proved to be 35 miles per hour, which resulted in 25.87 m.p.g. The same vehicles drove 16.75 m.p.g. at a steady 80 m.p.h. and only 12.5 m.p.g. at a steady eight m.p.h.

Besides speed, stop-and-go driving with rapid acceleration, a plugged air filter, an unadjusted automatic choke and underinflated tires are the most common of the many causes of poor gas mileage.

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
