Mennonites Snub Milk Subsidy

Religious convictions of Old Order Mennonites may hamper efforts to licence milk producers in Waterloo County.

Glenn Thompson, county agricultural representative, said several Old Order farmers have refused to accept government milk subsidy cheques.

He told committee members the same religious conviction may result in some farmers refusing to apply for a licence to produce milk as required by the Ontario Milk Marketing Board.

Under new board regulations, all producers in

the province, with the exception of cream shippers, must be licensed.

Fear has been expressed that those who fail to apply for the free license will not be paid for their milk.

Several members of the county committee were delegated to approach Old Order farmers to ascertain whether they intend to comply with the ruling.

Applications for licenses were mailed Nov. 21 Any shipper who did not receive one can obtain the required form from his plant, dairy fieldman, agricultural representative or the board.
