### Realtors Rapped

By ELSA STORRY PICKERING-The Pickering Township Committee of Adjustment wishes that real estate agents would not tell their clients

that a 10-acre parcel in the

township is the smallest

acreage they can buy. This is not true, they say, but anything from a 2acre parcel up, may be separated One condition is that the parcel have the required frontage - 200 feet for a 2-acre parcel up to 500 feet for a 10-acre

Planning Director John Faulkner is of the opinion that realtors are aware of this, but when they tell their prospects that 10 acres is the least they can buy, they forget to add "without application to the Committee of Adjustment for consent."

Because of this "being taught and preached by the real estate people" as one man put it, A. H. Mc-Kenzie was refused a consent to sever a 6-acre parcel from an 81-acre holding, with frontage on the Brock Road at the 5th concession of 330 feet. A parcel of this size requires 390 feet.

Mr. McKenzie found himself in a "hemmed in" position. He originally owned a frontage of 1700 feet. He sold 870 feet The United Church Skat- frontage to the north tomake up 10 acres, for he had been told he could March 4 from 2 to 4 p.m. sell no less than that.
