

To Establish Anti-Rabies' Clinics In Ontario County

CLAREMONT — The Health and Animals Division of the Department of Agriculture will establish clinics in Ontario County for the vaccination of dogs and cats against rabies. Persons residing outside the County boundary may bring their pets to any one of the locations convenient to their residence. The service, made available free of charge, is considered necessary, due to the number of rabies' cases reported in the area. The co-operation of the public is requested in an effort to make the program a success. Clinics will be located at the following places and at times listed below:

CLAREMONT — A consent was granted by the Pickering Township Committee of Adjustment last week to the division of a lot which had been separated in 1957, sold and re-sold, all without approval of the Committee or planning board at that time.

Mr. Fred Evans of Claremont submitted a deed showing him the owner of a lot separated from that of Adriano Ortiz in 1957. Investigation revealed that Mr. Evans was not the owner of the lot, but had sold it in 1957 without consulting the township.

A prospective purchaser of the lot, in 1967, is now aware that the lot, No. 33, does include the 9 feet 10 inches, which Mr. Evans thought he had not originally sold.

And Mr. Ortiz, now visiting in Spain, has a deed which shows his lot does not include the elusive nine feet.

The lot is on the south-west corner of the 9th Concession and Livingston Street in Claremont.

It is all straightened out now by the granting of the consent, which legalizes the land division which occurred in the first place.

The new Ontario Riding includes the Townships of Pickering, Whitby, East Whitby, Reach, Uxbridge, Scugog, Scott; the Towns of Port Perry, Uxbridge and Ajax and the Village of Pickering from the old Riding. Added to the new Riding are the Townships of North Gwillimbury, Georgina and the Town of Sutton which were formerly a part of the Riding of North York.
