Stouffville Players next three act play, "The Mouse Trap," will be directed by Bill Rankin and presented May 17 and 18.

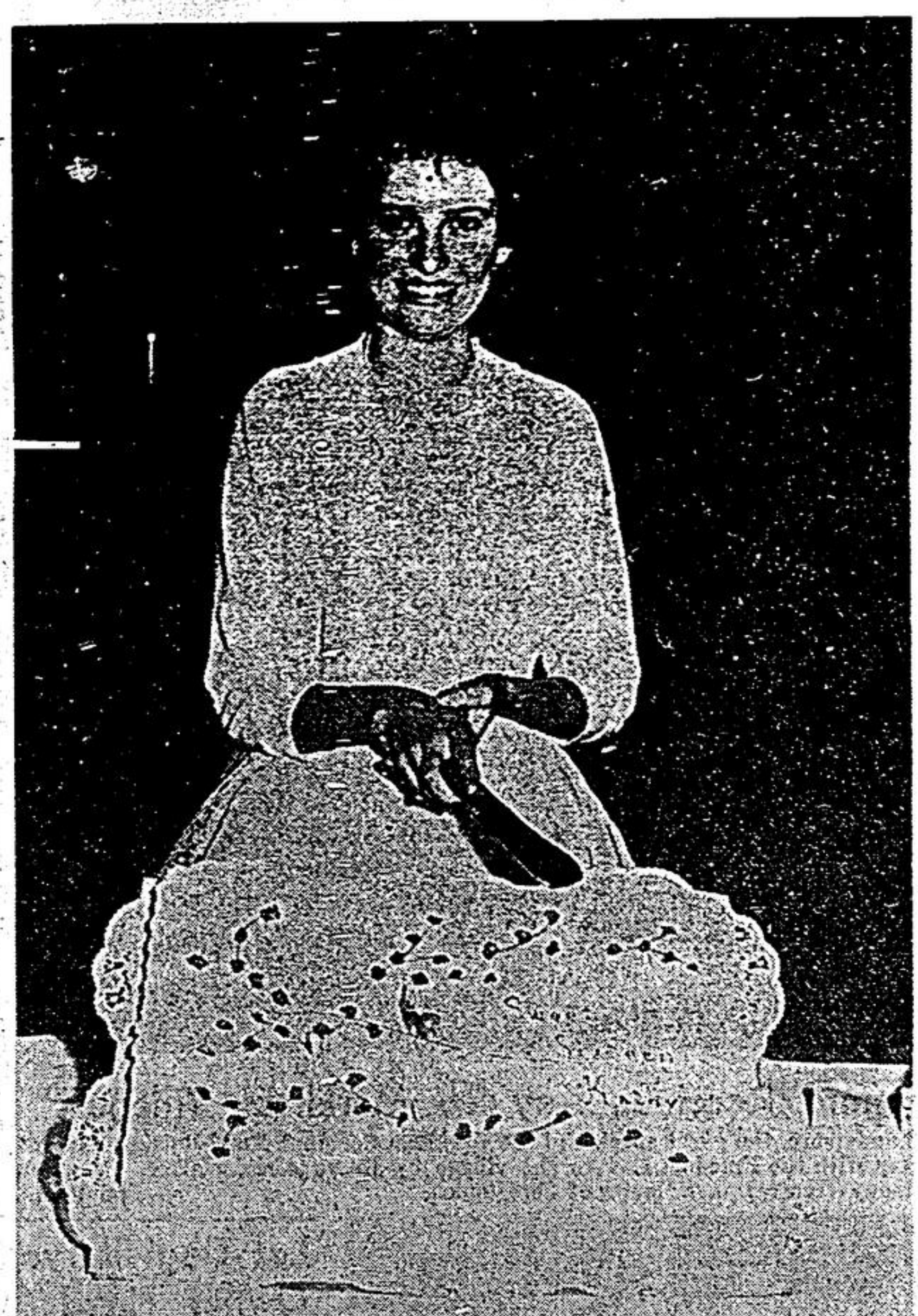
