

NDP Organizes In Ontario Riding

PEFFERLAW — The election of officers were held at the general membership meeting of Ontario North Riding New Democratic Party, held at the Pefferlaw Community Hall.

K. E. Larsen from Sutton West was elected president, Jan Rendering, Sunderland, Vice-president; Allen McPhail, Cannington, Secretary Treasurer, Howard Johnston, Goodwood, Membership Secretary.

Cliff Pilkey, president of the Oshawa and District Labour Council and past councillor for the city of Oshawa was the guest speaker.

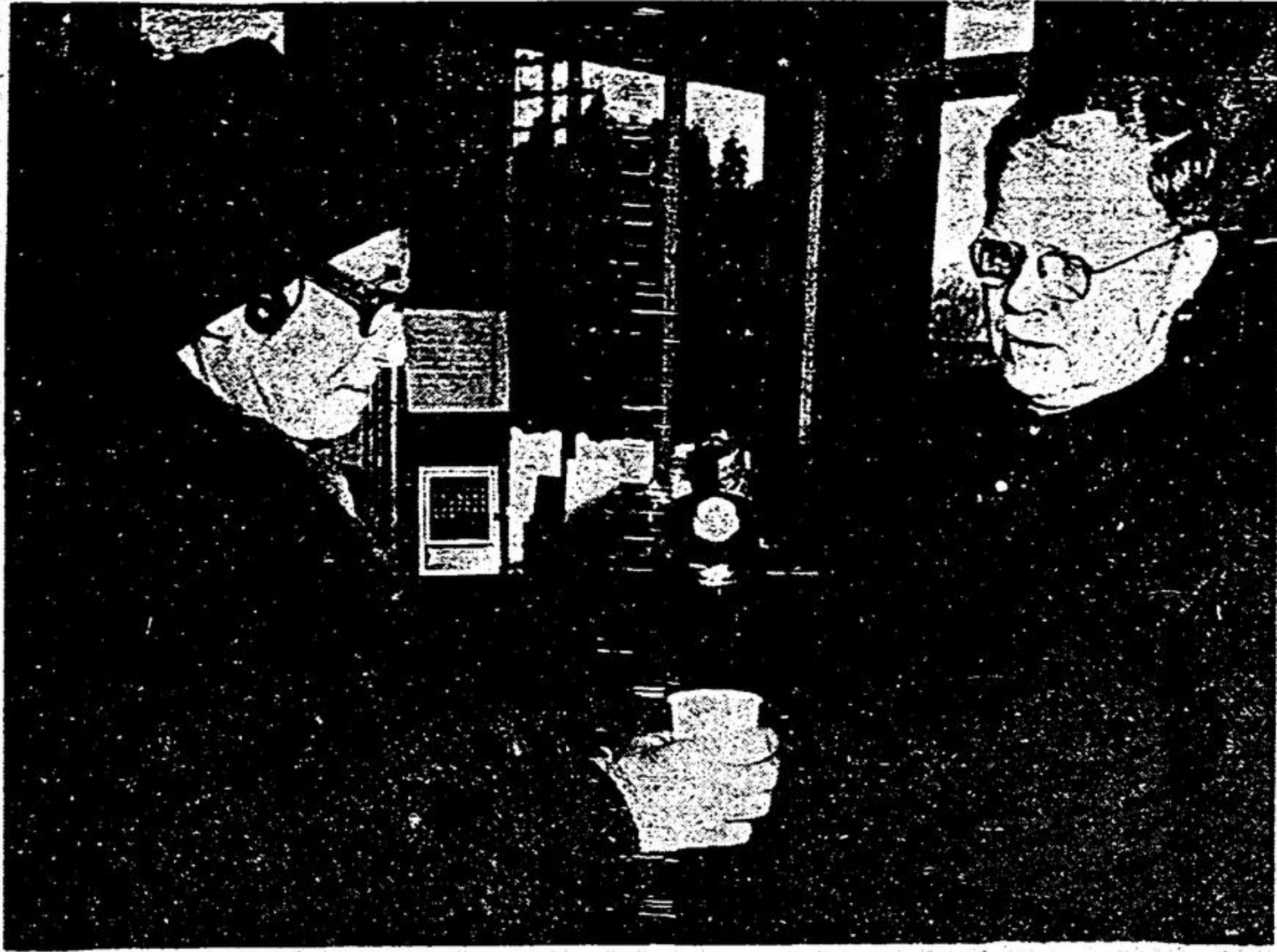
He said the New Democratic Party would set up a department of consumer affairs which would investigate the high cost of food and farm machinery. Auto insurance was discussed and Mr. Pilkey noted the average cost had increased 84% since 1925. Commenting on Co-operative Stores in the Ottawa area, he said consumers are saving 12 to 20% on their groceries.

Allen McPhail said industrial assessment should be pro-rated back to small towns in the case of men living in urban areas and travelling to industrial centres to work.

In closing Mr. Pilkey told the members that the New Democratic Party was on the move as the Gallup Polls indicate and to win votes for the party was just a matter of getting the issues across to the people.

Area Organizer, Bill Cumptsy, explained how area groups would be set up throughout the riding and each group would have a representative sitting on the executive board of Ontario Riding.

A general membership meeting will be held, possibly in April.

Seek Safety Measures

PICKERING — Now that Pickering Township municipal building has been occupied for about 5 months, the Department of Labor approves the project, subject to certain directions being fulfilled.

Directions like boilers being enclosed with fire-resistant material, a 4-inch block wall built around the furnace, the stairway being built from floor to ceiling with fire-resistant material, and several others.

At a meeting of council on Monday night, members wondered why this approval embracing the conditions was not forthcoming at the time of construction. Reeve Laycox stating that the building should not have been constructed without consultation between the architect and the department, and the stamp of approval on the plans.

A meeting will be set up with architects Craig, Zeidler and Strong immediately.
