Rev. D.R. McKillican Young People Want Proof Says Knox College Dean

STOUFFVILLE — "The young people of today refuse to accept anything—it must be proven," stated Rev. Donald R. McKillican, Dean of Knox College, and guest pastor at the morning service of St. James Presbyterian Church, Stouffville, Sunday. "We live in a society of free-thinkers where nothing is supreme, nothing is eternal and nothing has universal value. We continue to build more and more churches but they have less and less influence. We have reached a critical period."

Rev. McKillican told the congregation that many persons, especially young people feel the church is so negative in its thinking and withdrawn that there is little use in approaching it for help. "They feel we're religious museums, fossils or dinosaurs—on the way out." He said that times had changed from the day when the Bible was taken as fact and a certain code of conduct was taken as correct. "Now nothing is accepted at face value," he said, "the old foundations have been shattered. SUCCESS NOT SERVICE"

The pastor, in a challenging message, charged that secular and materialistic thinking has become dominant in our world. "The status-symbol of society today is the gathering together of as much of this world's wealth as possible. The dominant philosophy of life is no longer service but success."

Rev. McKillican noted that, in spite of the trend, man's thinking today is much the same as in Biblical times. "We Christians cannot expect to win every battle. The most important thing is to be involved, to make our mark in the world. "Some people refuse to fight unless they are assured of victory or refuse to run a race unless they can win." Touching on his own work as Dean of Knox College, Rev. McKillican said that across Canada, there are 200 Presbyterian Church congregations that require permanent pastors.
