

The most important thing is to be involved, to make our mark in the world. "Some people refuse to fight unless they are assured of victory or refuse to run a race unless they can win." Touching on his own work as Dean of Knox College, Rev. Mc-Killican said that across Canada, there are 200 Presbyterian Church congregations that require permanent pastors.
