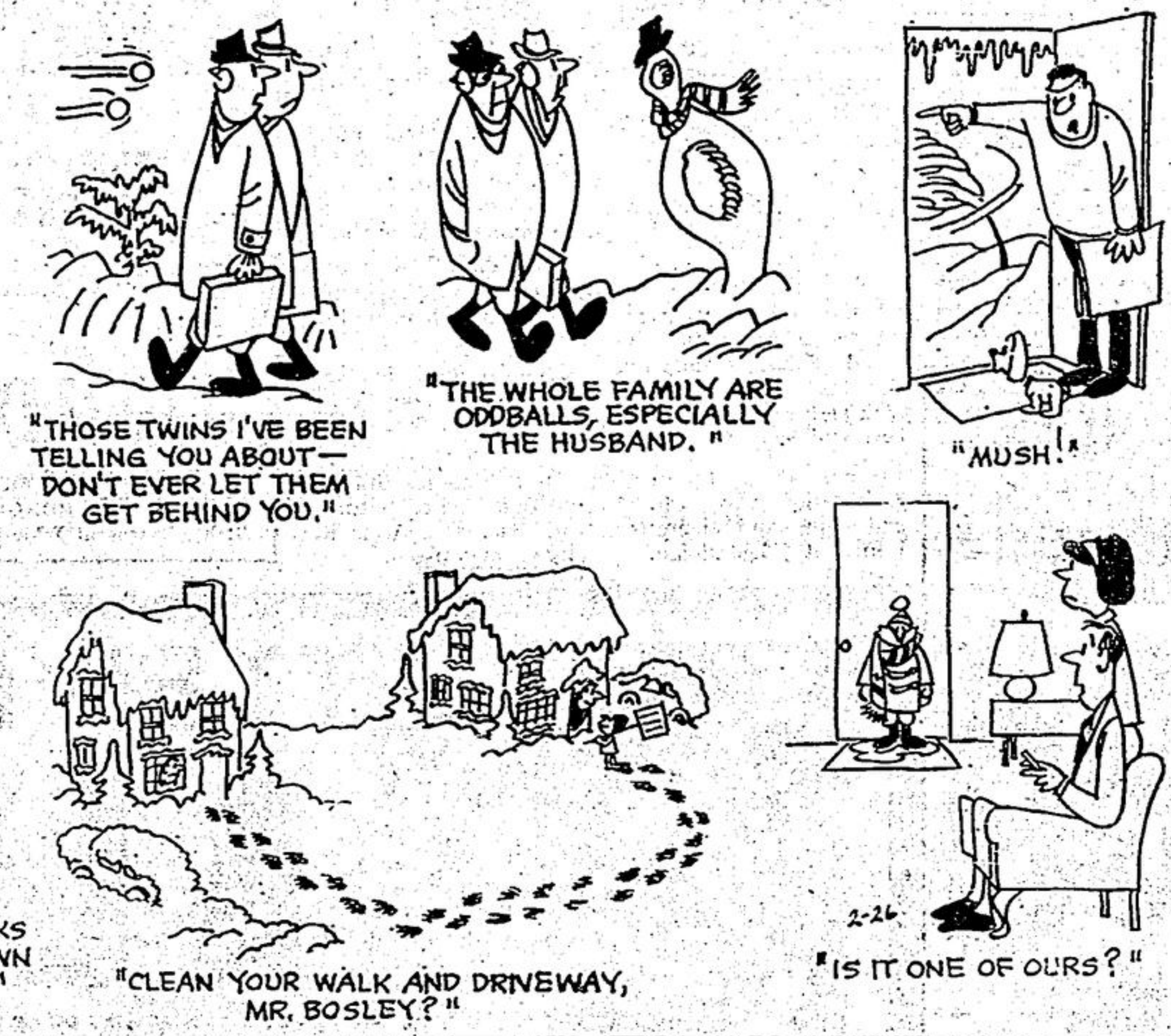
**Ambulance Course At Fire Hall**

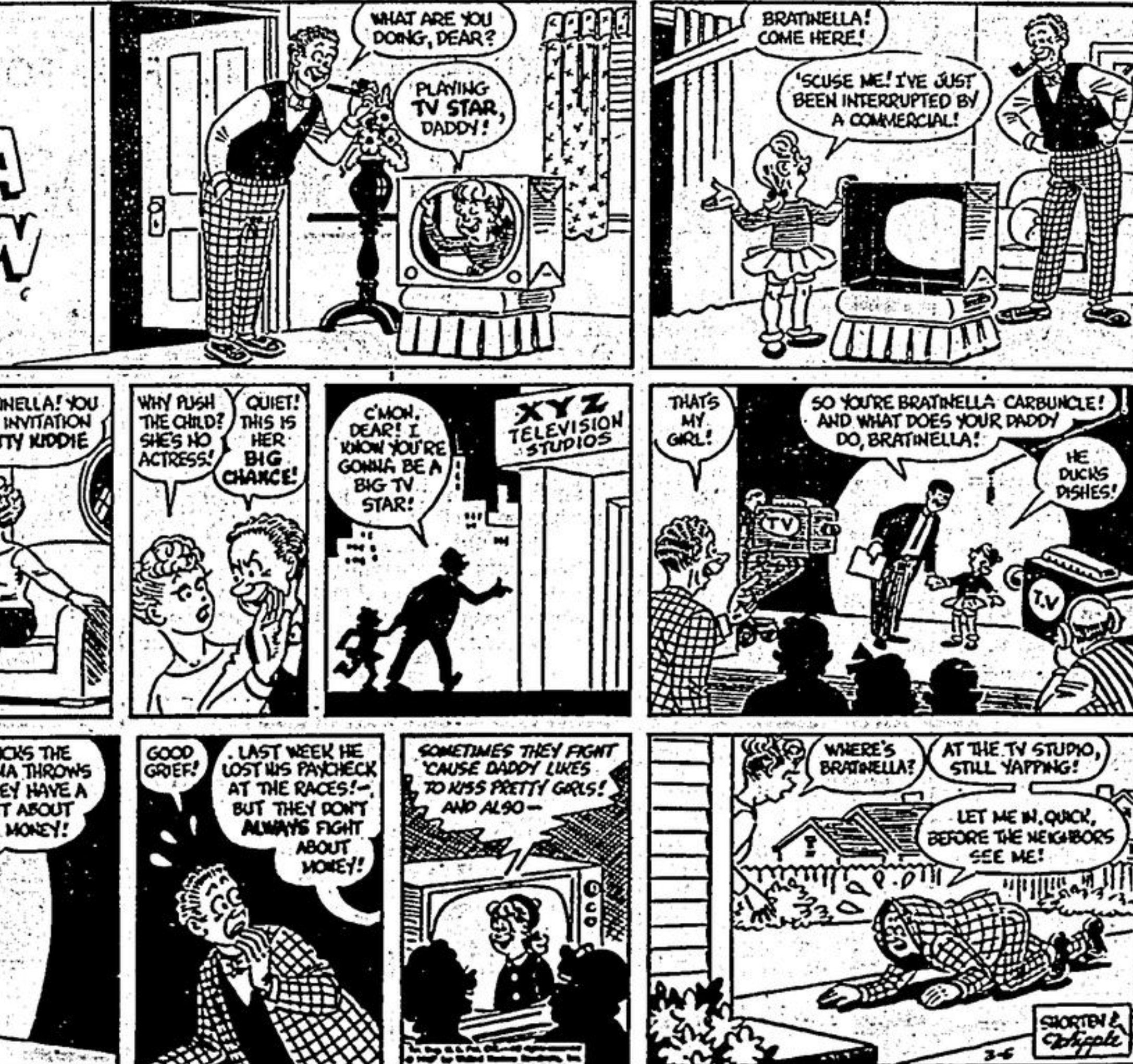
