## Whitevale Man Permitted 2 Lots

WHITEVALE — R. G. Page has been granted consent by the Pickering Township Committee of Adjustment to divide a 6½ acre parcel on the Altona Road south of Whitevale into two lots, one a village lot, the other an agricultural lot.

On the village lot a house of 1150 square feet can be erected, on the other the house must be 2,000 square feet.

Mr. Page's original application was to divide the parcel into three lots, two

village-sized and one agricultural, a dwelling to be built on each.

**VIEWED SITE**

The planning board had viewed the site and were not in favor of extending the village boundary by an extra lot.

The two lots will have frontages of 110 feet, and 280 feet.

Harry White, who farms next to the property in question, appeared before the board, not to oppose the application, but to "have it go on record"

that the committee seemed to be very discriminatory.

Mr. White said that he had farmed there all his life, and wanted to leave the farm to his son. He wants to build a house next to Mr. Page's lot.

**THREE ALTERNATIVES**

Planning Director John Faulkner said that he believed Mr. White was concerned that Mr. Page could separate a lot, but that this was because his land abutted the village.

Mr. Faulkner said that Mr. White had three alternatives — to convince the municipality his farm operation was sufficient to have an accessory house; separate a two-acre lot, or a ten-acre lot.

Member John Head said that in approving Mr. Page's application, the committee was, in fact, approving an 80-foot shortage in the agricultural lot frontage.

"The reason I would approve the variance," he said, "is because a ravine cuts down its usefulness."

## Classes To Be Held In Pioneer Village School

A Centennial project by four North York schools will bring alive the century-old Dickinson's Hill school at Black Creek Pioneer Village.

Children from the schools will take turns taking their classes in the building for the last six weeks of the school term. The plan has been approved by the North York Board of Education and the executive of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, which operates the village.

Plans call for the North York teachers in charge of the classes to be in pioneer costume and it is hoped that many of the students will also be in pre-Confederation dress. Notebooks and textbooks will be abandoned for the classes. The children will use slates and subjects such as mathematics will

be taught in relation to the buying and selling of goods at the nearby general store.

The program will enhance the regular school tours of the village by other students and adult visitors. Instead of seeing an empty, lifeless school building visitors will see it being used as it was 100 years ago.

The idea originated with the principals of the four schools that will take part. Robert Preston, principal of Stilecroft Public School said that although the school can accommodate 50 children, classes will be kept down to 30. In order to have the most children possible take part in the program the groups will be changed every day or every second day.

Mr. Preston hopes that at least 150 of his students will be able to take part in the program.
