Chairman Unionville Home Association

 UNIONVILLE — Rev. Lloyd Wiseman was the unanimous choice as chairman of the Unionville Home Association, when approximately 50 members of that organization met at the Kennedy Clinic, Kennedy Road, Unionville, on Thursday evening, Mar. 9. Other officers named (also unanimously) were: Vice-chairman, Keith Kennedy; Secretary, Philip Colley; Treasurer, Malcolm MacKenzie; Directors, Harry Boardway, Robert Dowse, Martin Mc Closkey and Mrs. Janet Patterson. A constitution was also adopted.

The Home Association is sponsored by the Unionville Council of Churches and on Mar. 9 there was a charter membership of 64. At present the fee is \$100, and membership is invited. The objective of the new association is to establish a Senior Citizens' Home in the village as a centennial project, and members hope to pattern it after the Parkview Home at Stouffville which was built by the Menno-nite Home Ass'n of York County and houses more than 60 senior residents. "We are very conscious that we are not just building a building, but providing a home in which the accent is on living," said

Mr. Wiseman as he accepted the chairmanship. "We hope to supply special interests," he continued. "If the ladies like to mend, let them mend—it gives them a sense of usefulness." He also suggested that local clubs could be of help: "The Horticultural Society could set up a wheat germination test for each room—there could be a canning bee, aided by a Women's group."

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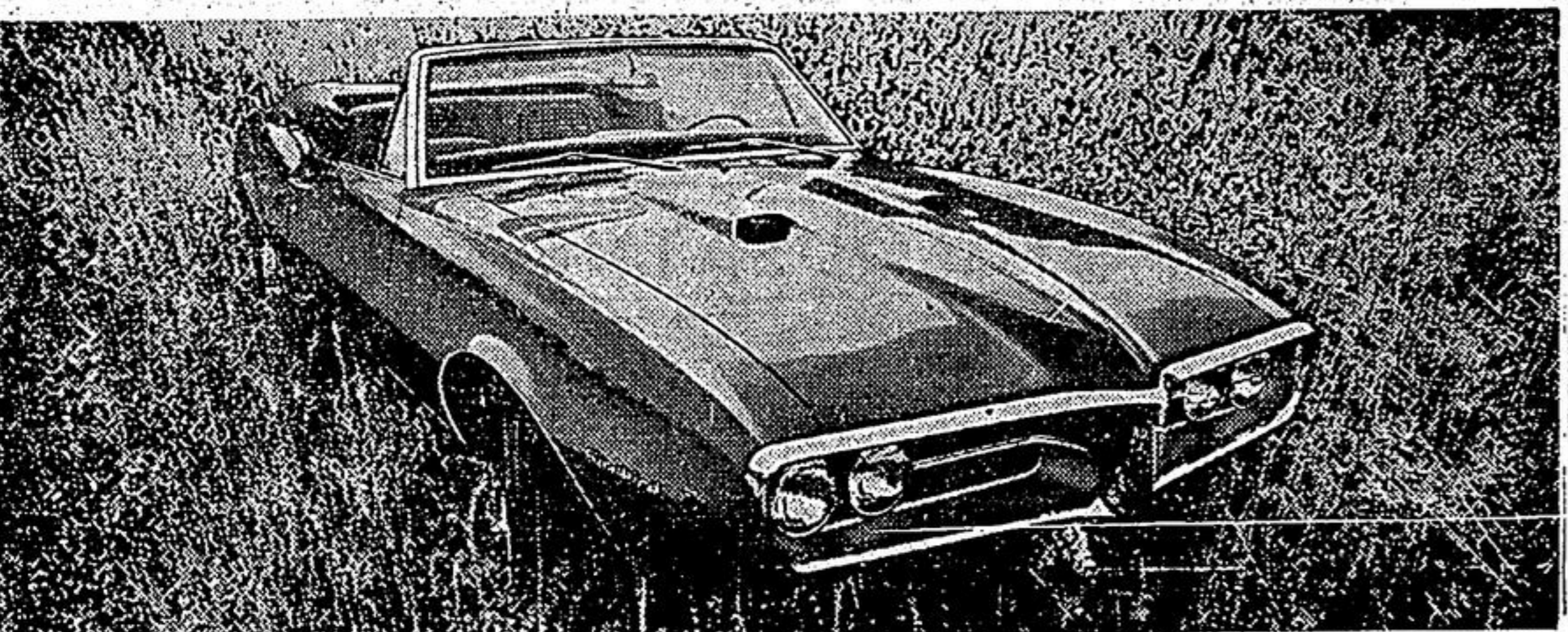
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Legion News

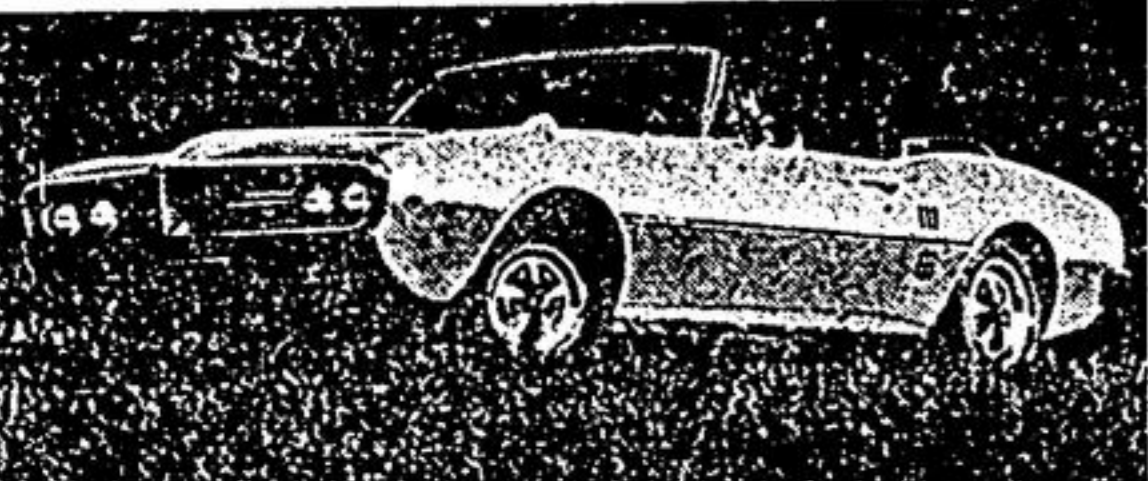
