Health Minister Matthew Dymond will start an immunization program against measles starting April 15.

He told the legislature the program will have two phases—namely, the protection of infants through the use of a killed vaccine and the protection of those susceptible starting school in September with a live vaccine.

A vaccine prepared by Connaught Laboratories, Toronto, to protect infants against measles, diphtheria, lockjaw, whooping cough and polio, will be released April 15.

This "quintuple" vaccine will be given children beginning at three months. Three doses of the killed vaccine are needed for complete immunization.

A live "attenuated" measles vaccine will be available in September for children entering kindergarten and Grade 1.

"In this phase of the program, adequate surveillance by competent persons will be maintained and a month's interval or longer will be observed between the administration of any two live vaccines," the minister said.

"This surveillance will be the duty of the local health agencies."
